Twenty-eight students from Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville are recognized in the 1995-96 edition of "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges."

Students were selected by a campus nominating committee, along with the editors of the annual publication.

Faculty and staff comprised the campus nominating committee, which nominated students based primarily on their academic achievement, but also included service to the community, leadership in extracurricular activities and potential for continued success.

This year, 36 students qualified under the criteria, and their names were sent to the editors of the annual

## SIUE chosen for academic strength

In a study conducted by Collegiate Information Services, a research and consulting firm from Riverside, Conn., "Academic Programs" were cited as the strength of Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville.

SIUE was one of only eight schools, both public and private, to receive the citation for academic strength.

The schools were chosen from a list of over 800 colleges and universities across the country.

The top three schools in the survey were the following: the University of Chicago, Northwestern University and the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

Other schools making the list were: the Illinois Institute of Technology, Loyola University of Chicago, Quincy University and Roosevelt University.

This was the second year of the study, which was conducted through self-administered questionnaires mailed to 502 high school guidance counselors nationwide during the 1994-1995 academic year.

"Guidance counselors develop a substantial knowledge about the strengths and weakness of school, and the type of ratings developed in this study complements the marketing

## in brief

**Conviction rate hits new high**

• St. Clair County's 87 percent felony conviction record for 1995 surprised even the prosecutors who handled the court cases, the county's chief prosecutors said Tuesday. Recent number-crunching of the prosecutors' 1995 cases showed convictions in 927 of 1,051 felony cases.

**Court criticized child-abuse policy**

• In 1991, the federal appeals court here warned the St. Louis School Board that its child-abuse reporting policy and training requirements left board members vulnerable to damage suits. More than four years later, the district is still using the child-abuse policy that the appeals court found lacking.

**Simpson gets break from giving his deposition**

• O.J. Simpson's deposition in civil wrongful death suits filed by the families of Nicole Brown Simpson and Ronald Goldman will be resumed Feb. 19. Simpson was questioned for five days last week. Simpson's attorney, Robert C. Baker, said he could not continue the deposition this week because of a scheduling conflict.

**Dangerously cold temperatures forecasted**

• Meteorologists are offering a frigid forecast through the weekend, when the temperature will feel more like the North Pole than the Mississippi Valley. The Arctic cold mass that arrived earlier this week from Canada and stalled over the region is to blame. Brisk wind only worsens the effects of the single-digit temperatures.

**Prosecutors will seek execution**

• Fort Bragg, N.C. military prosecutors will seek the death penalty in the case of an Army sergeant accused of killing one soldier and wounding 18 in a sniper attack on a crowded exercise field, a spokesman said Tuesday. Sgt. William Kreutzer, 26, was arraigned Tuesday on murder and attempted murder charges in the Oct. 27 attack.

#### Youths can interview for jobs at Six Flags

• The Urban League of Metropolitan St. Louis and Six Flags Over Mid-America are joining forces to provide summer job opportunities for area youth.

Six Flags will be interviewing teen-agers, at least 16 years old, at the Urban League, 3701 Grandel Square, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday.

#### Archer: GOP should continue push for capital gains cut

• A capital gains tax cut should be part of legislation extending the government's borrowing authority, House Ways and Means Chairman Bill Archer said Tuesday.

Archer, R-Texas, said he doubted the Republican-controlled Congress would vote to raise the nation's debt ceiling unless President Clinton agreed to attach substantial spending cuts and tax reductions. Archer said they should include a cut in capital gains taxes.

### International

#### U.S. naval leader in Gulf wary of new attack missile

• Iran has test-fired a new low-flying missile designed to attack ships the commander of U.S. naval forces in the Gulf said Tuesday.

Vice Adm. Scott Redd, commander of the Gulf-based U.S. 5th Fleet, said Iran also had expanded its network of anti-aircraft and other missiles based on land and was likely to add a third Russian-made submarine to its fleet this year.

For African-Americans, the beginning of Black History month signifies that we must not only concern ourselves with knowing, analyzing and learning our history, but also dedicate ourselves to making history.

This year, elections address vital issues facing millions of African-Americans today: affirmative action, welfare, financial aid and health benefits. We can make history in three ways: use our right to vote to the fullest, increase self-reliance and strengthen morality.

With increased voting comes increased political power. That power thrives from having the chance to elect officials who can pass laws that would be beneficial to our people. Without our vote, Clinton would not have been elected president in the 1992 election. And once again, without our vote, he stands a good chance of not being re-elected.

The power that voting gives us can also have lasting effects on social and economic factors. Failing to vote leaves a serious void in one's life—that person has no right to criticize or be opinionated about the elected officials.

The Million Man March last October could serve as a catalyst for self-reliance for African-Americans. Along with voting, there are things people can do to help themselves and others. African-American history is a subject

To that end, we must also take back our neighborhoods from gangs and drugs, and also commit ourselves to the beautification of our neighborhoods.

In this day of enlightenment, individuals who call women "bitches" or verbally assault them are not cute; nor, for that matter, are those who label African-American men as dogs. If anything,

we should concern ourselves more with building our communities using the 'It takes a village to raise a child' mentality, where respect and responsibility rein supreme.

In this month of celebration, let us not only admire and salute those leaders of our past, but dedicate ourselves to producing leaders and heroes for the future—and that future starts today.

Alamogordo (N.M.)—When an exclusive club suddenly loses one member in eight, that's cause for the remaining members to worry. When the exclusive club is the U.S. Senate, citizens ought to be concerned, too.

The recently announced retirements from the U.S. Senate will change Congress, and not for the better.

All the members leaving have their individual reasons. Some have simply reached the time for retirement after many years of service.

But most are plainly dissatisfied with the tone of the Senate and political life in the 1990s: the sharp increase in partisanship and ideological approaches to policy; the decline of collegiality; the filibusters; the grind of fundraising; the evasion of important issues.

For the Senate's best, serving in the upper house has simply come to seem more pain than reward.

"The reasoning behind 'Sista 2 Sista' is to promote unity among African-American women on campus and to promote communication with each other. It also creates a support system for us to share our problems and concerns" Scott said.

Latisha Robinson, executive secretary of BSA, said that the program is basically an open discussion that gives African-American women a chance to voice their concerns about what they would like to see changed on campus.

Some of the topics explored at the program were 'practicing what you preach' and some ideas concerned the outcasting that occurs among women on campus.

"We are so few in number on campus. We must stick together and communicate if we want to be successful," Scott said.

The next "Sista 2 Sista" meeting will be in the fall of 1997.

activities of schools to provide prospective students with a better sense of which schools are most appropriate for pursuing a college degree (at)," Richard Plank, a Ph.D. from the Association of Marketing at Western Michigan's Haworth School of Business, stated.

Today, colleges and universities are becoming more aware of their public images.

"The competition for the best students increases every year and that is why many colleges are borrowing marketing techniques that are used by sophisticated consumer marketers," Plank said.

The study also explored other issues concerning high school students. Although 58 percent of the counselors surveyed agreed with the statement, "There is too much over-promise in the promotional materials of most colleges," this was a drastic reduction from the 74 percent who agreed with the statement the preceding year.



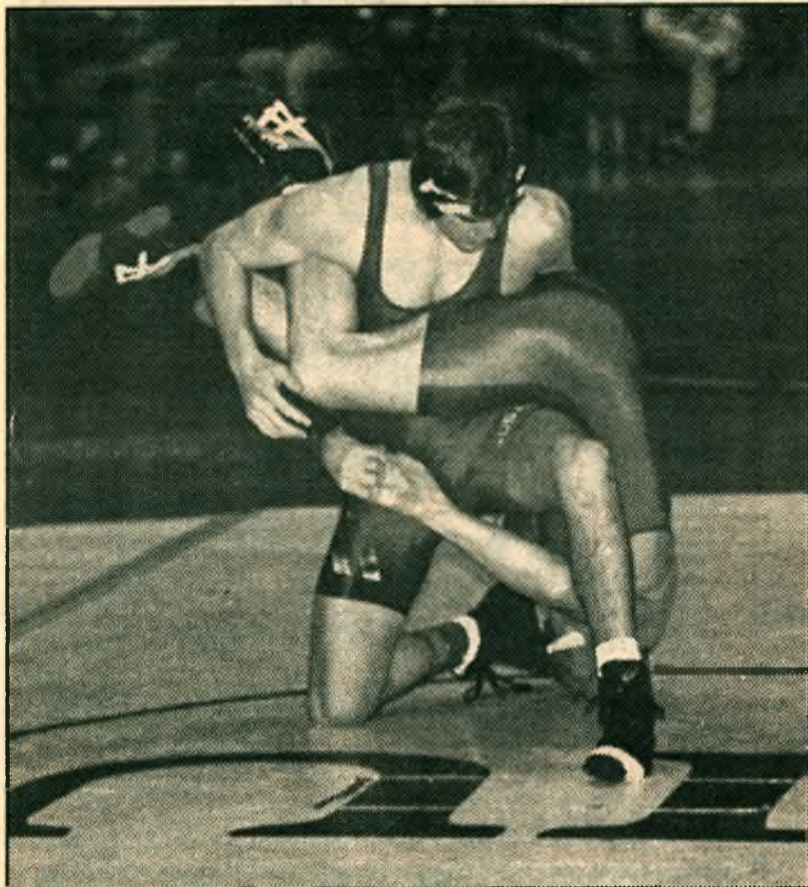

## Wrestling team struggles, but four individuals excel

The SIUE Wrestlers had a mediocre team performance this past weekend at the National Duals Meet in Edmond, Okla., but four team members personally went undefeated in their weight classes.

The Cougars wrestled five times during the two day long meet.

In the first match on Friday, SIUE drew Chadron State in a contest that would put the winner in the first round of the tournament. The Cougars lost by a score of 30-18 to put them into the consolation bracket. There the team lost a close contest to Fort Hays State, 25-24, but ended the first day strong with a 25-22 victory over Southern Colorado in the consolation elimination showdown.

The team's next task was a rematch against Fort Hays State on Saturday. SIUE fell in defeat again, 30-21, when they had to forfeit the matches in the 118 pound, 167 pound and 177 pound weight classes. Indianapolis was the Cougars' last victim of the weekend as they rounded out the meet with a 26-21 victory.

Brian Anderson took care of the 126 pound weight class with a 5-0 record. He defeated Brad Krotz of Chadron State, Cody Bickley of Fort Hays State twice, Bobby Neff of Southern Colorado and Chad Red of Indianapolis.

In the 134 weight class, Shawn Hickey couldn't be contained as he not only defeated all of his opponents, but pinned them all. He started with Jared Todd from Chadron State, and continued to cruise past his opposition with two victories over John Hodgson of Fort Hays State and wins against Nick Lopez of Southern Colorado and Richard VanOsdol of Indianapolis.

Jason Carter continued with the dominance that has given him a national ranking in the 190 pound weight class with victories over Dave Marich of Chadron State, Chris Thyfault of Fort Hays State on two occasions and Alex Tapia of Southern Colorado.

Heavyweight Mike Rogers contributed five wins also as he rolled past Jay Long of Chadron State, Danius Walls of Fort Hays State twice, Zac Dahle of Southern Colorado and Derrick Robinson of Indianapolis.

"The outcome of the match isn't my greatest concern," said coach Larry Kristoff. "I'm more interested in if my wrestlers are wrestling up to their potential. I was really impressed with Shawn Hickey at 134 and my heavyweight, Mike Rogers."

The next opponent for the Cougars will be a home match against Central Missouri State tonight. The match will begin at 7 p.m. in the Vadalabene Center.

He's baaaack! That's right—just when I thought Ronnie Henderson couldn't get any hotter, he burst into flames. Ronnie is the first ever to make the Cougar Corner two weeks in a row.

Even though Ronnie was in the Corner last Thursday, he was en fuego over the weekend.

He came out strong Thursday and poured in 23 points. He was one rebound shy of a double-double with nine and also chipped in with three blocks and two steals. These stats translated into a six-point Cougar victory over Bellarmine, 74-68.

Henderson wasn't done, though: he came back with another strong night during Saturday night's foul-fest against Kentucky Wesleyan. Five of the nine Cougars that played Saturday had at least four fouls, and Ronnie was one of the three that fouled out. Still, in 28 minutes of action he managed 15 points and 5 rebounds.

One of the biggest problems for this year's undersized Cougars has been inside toughness. As of late, the stocky 6-foot-2 Henderson has done what he can to lend some muscle inside.

"It's taken him a while to get into the system. Lately, he's gotten more aggressive, especially on the offensive boards," head coach Jack Margenthaler said.

Keep up the good work Ronnie. We'll be watching.

When watching the women's game this weekend I had no doubt who would be the Cougar Corner. Senior Terrie Evans is the consummate floor general.

On Thursday, the point guard dropped the three-point bomb ten times and connected on six of them. She ended the game in which she only played 36 minutes due to injury with 18 points and 7 assists.

She came back Saturday night playing her usual 40 minutes, poured in 22 points and snatched 5 rebounds. Coach Walter Hedberg had this to say about her star leader:

"She's one of the top players we've ever had here. She's the player that the other coaches need to get ready for."

And it's tough for coaches to prepare for her because she is such a complete player.

"She's a great passer—she thinks she can pass ahead and can read the floor well. She can drive well, but if the other team stops her, she'll take the outside shot," Hedberg said.

Watching Evans float across the floor is a pleasure and anyone who hasn't seen her play, they don't know what they're missing.

"Terri could've gone to a Division I school. She is that good. I've got a lot of inquiries and some people who want her to play in the newly forming women's professional leagues," Hedberg said.
