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

THE AUGUST MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the University Center, Edwardsville Campus, on Thursday, August 3, 1967, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Vice-Chairman Lindell W. Sturgis, Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., Harold R. Fischer, Melvin C. Lockard, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Hitt, and Mr. Page were absent.

The Vice-Chairman presented minutes of a regular meeting held June 29, 1967, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., these minutes were approved as presented.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

SUMMARY REPORT ON STUDENT ACTIVITY FEES

A document entitled "Summary Report on Student Activity Fees," dated May, 1967, was presented to each member of the Board of Trustees

in advance of the meeting, and a copy was placed on file in the office of the Board.

Professor I. Clark Davis, Assistant to Vice-President Ralph W. Ruffner, presented a brief explanation of what monies make up the Student Activity Fees accounts, the procedures developed for the allocation of such funds to various student groups and projects, and the controls established over expenditure of such funds. He indicated that the Board of Trustees approves allocation of Student Activity Fees at the same time the Annual Internal Budget for Operations is considered, following consideration and approval by various student and administrative offices.

Mr. Sturgis and President Morris expressed appreciation for the presentation made by Mr. Davis. No action was required by the Board of Trustees.

MOTOR VEHICLE REGULATIONS

On May 27, 1955 (1954–55 Annual Report, p. 116) the Board approved certain parking fines and procedures; on August 3, 1956 (1956–57 Annual Report, p. 14) the Board enacted its policy on student motor vehicles; and on July 25, 1957 (1957–58 Annual Report, p. 16) a schedule of penalties for violations was enacted. There are many specific directives in these documents which are no longer appropriate in the University we have become some ten years later. A revised code of motor vehicle regulations has therefore been drafted by the Office of the Dean of Students, the Security Office, and the Office of Legal Counsel. Enactment by the Board is necessary to accomplish repeal of all previous regulations.

There are two further reasons for asking the Board to act in this matter. Under the power granted by the General Assembly to enact regulations, the parking provisions may extend to staff and visitors; most previous regulations of the Board of Trustees were applicable to students only. Also, in case of legal challenge, the specific authority of the Board of Trustees may be required for a regulation to be held enforceable. In a case involving Mississippi State University one year ago, the school was forced to admit in court that only the 1954 regulations of its Board were valid, and not the 1958 modifications of them by school administrators.

The following resolution is therefore recommended for approval at this time:

Resolution

MOTOR VEHICLE REGULATORY POLICIES

September 1, 1967

Southern Illinois University Carbondale, Illinois

Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular meeting assembled, that the following Motor Vehicle Regulatory Policies shall be in effect at the Carbondale Campus of the University from and after September 1, 1967, and all regulations inconsistent therewith are as of that date repealed:

- I. All laws of the State of Illinois concerning vehicles and their operation, including but not limited to the Illinois Motor Vehicle Law and the Uniform Act Regulating Traffic on Highways, are hereby incorporated in these regulations as if reproduced herein in full. Pursuant thereto, the posting of signs regulating traffic and parking by the Security Officer shall be deemed to have been duly done by local authority as therein defined.
- II. No visitor unaffiliated with the University either as a student or employee shall park any motor vehicle on Campus except in spaces or lots provided for visitors and so marked and in accordance with such markings or the directions of any attendant or officer present at that lot.
- III. Permission to bring private vehicles onto University property is granted only to persons who comply with motor vehicle laws, these regulatory policies, administrative regulations pursuant thereto, and the directives of duly authorized police officers; all others shall be deemed trespassers. Violators shall be referred to state courts or to internal disciplinary authorities, as deemed most effective.
- IV. No student shall use, operate or possess any motor vehicle, including any motorized cycle, while enrolled at the Carbondale Campus except with permission of the Dean of Students. Such permissions shall be based upon need or upon advanced or superior academic standing.
- V. The cognizant University authorities are authorized to impose sanctions for violation of these regulations including but not necessarily limited to monetary assessments not to exceed \$50.00, withdrawal of the motor vehicle privilege, removal of trespassing vehicles at the owner's expense, or internal disciplinary action, or any combination of the above. Particularly in the case of a student who is, or whose vehicle is, involved in any way with unauthorized operation, use or possession of a motor vehicle, disciplinary action may extend to suspension from the University for both the quarter in which the violation occurred and for a succeeding quarter.
- VI. Violators shall be entitled to a hearing of a formality commensurate with the gravity of the offense, and to at least one appeal therefrom.
- VII. An administrative processing fee not to exceed \$5 per annum is authorized to help defray the costs of motor vehicle registration and enforcement of regulations.
- Mr. Ray Lenzi, Carbondale Student Senate President, appeared before the Board and was introduced to the members of the Board. In accordance with permission granted by Mr. Kenneth L. Davis, Chairman of the Board, Mr. Lenzi presented the following alternatives to Paragraphs IV and V of the regulatory policies set forth above:
- IV. Any student may use, operate, or possess any motor vehicle, including any motorized cycle, while enrolled at Carbondale Campus providing he has obtained the permission of the Dean of Students. Such permission shall be based on need, age, and class. In consideration of class permissions, seniors shall precede juniors and juniors shall precede sophomores.
- V. The cognizant University authorities are authorized to impose sanctions for violation of these regulations including but not necessarily limited to monetary assessments not to exceed \$50.00, withdrawal of the motor vehicle privilege, removal of trespassing vehicles at the owner's expense, or internal disciplinary

actions, or any combination of the above. Suspension may be considered as a punishment for repeated violations.

Chairman Lindell W. Sturgis and President Morris expressed the appreciation of the Board and the administration for Mr. Lenzi's presentation. President Morris indicated his regret that these alternatives had not been submitted prior to the meeting. He further indicated that during the ensuing academic year the matter of language in the policy statement can be studied.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board adopted the resolution as presented by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

CENTENNIAL WORLD RESOURCES CENTER, PHASE I REPORT

An "interim report" dated July, 1967, which is the first phase report from Geometrics, Inc., was mailed to the members of the Board of Trustees on July 18, 1967, and a copy was placed in the office of the Board. Presentation of this report will be made by a representative of the firm at the meeting on August 3, 1967.

Mr. Peter Floyd, a representative of Geometrics, Inc., Cambridge, Massachusetts, was introduced to the members of the Board. He spoke briefly concerning the eight points covered by Section 2 of the interim report prepared by Geometrics, Inc., entitled "General Considerations for Implementation." Mr. Floyd outlined the various questions which require decision, including the role of the proposed Center and its position within the University, staffing, physical location, fund solicitation, operative funding, strategy for setting up the Center, and a schedule of operations.

President Morris explained to the Board that by agreement with the State of Illinois Board of Higher Education a bill was introduced in the Legislature for \$4,000,000 for the establishment of the proposed Center, with the understanding that funds become available only when matched three to one by non-State funds. He indicated that the bill had been passed and was now awaiting signature by Governor Otto Kerner.

At the request of President Morris, Mr. R. Buckminster Fuller spoke briefly concerning the advantages of the proposed Centennial World Resources Center and its significance to the community, the State, the nation, and the world.

President Morris indicated that a final report is to be submitted by Geometrics, Inc., and it will be presented to the Board of Trustees at the meeting scheduled for September 22, 1967. No action was requested concerning the interim report considered.

CONSIDERATION OF BIDS FOR OFFICE WING ADDITION TO PHYSICAL SCIENCES BUILDING, EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

At President Morris' request, Vice-President Rendleman explained to the Board that bids had been received for construction of the office wing addition to the Physical Sciences Building, Edwardsville Campus. He indicated that the Illinois Building Authority was awaiting a recom-

mendation from the Board concerning the bids received. He further stated that the administration recommended rejection of all bids, inasmuch as these bids were substantially above the estimate of cost and would represent a cost of \$43.60 a square foot.

On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board determined to recommend to the Illinois Building Authority the rejection of all bids received for construction of the office wing addition to the Physical Sciences Building, Edwardsville Campus. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

He indicated that because of advanced age and physical condition it was impossible for Mr. Grant to come to Carbondale to receive the award. President Morris requested that the Board approve waiver of policy to allow presentation of the award to Mr. Grant in his office in Washington, D.C., hopefully with several members of the Board present for such ceremony.

The Vice-Chairman presented minutes of a regular meeting held August 3, 1967, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by Dr. Martin V. Brown, these minutes were approved as presented.

The Board next considered the Annual Internal Budget for Operations, 1967–68, other than personal service items which had been approved at the regular meetings held May 26 and June 29, 1967. Copies of the Annual Internal Budget for Operations were mailed to members of the Board of Trustees on September 18, 1967, and a copy was placed on file in the office of the Board.

On motion of F. Guy Hitt, seconded by Dr. Martin V. Brown, the Board adopted the following resolution:

Be It Resolved, the Internal Budget for Operations of the University for the fiscal year July 1, 1967, through June 30, 1968, is approved for implementation as presented.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

EARLY ADMISSIONS POLICY

At the December 12, 1959, meeting of the Board of Trustees an admission policy for undergraduate students was proposed and approved. This policy was modified by actions taken by the Board of Trustees on December 10, 1960; April 24, 1964; and March 17, 1965.

These policies were basically intended to limit and control the admission of low-ranking students. Consideration has also been given to the admission of high-ranking students, many of whom wish to have early assurance that they can be admitted to the University. Both the Faculty Council and the University Council now propose the following policy, which is herewith recommended to the Board of Trustees for approval:

Any exceptionally capable high school student who (a) is a senior, (b) is recommended by his high school principal, and (c) is approved by the Director of Admissions of the University will be permitted to enroll for college courses to be taken concurrently with his senior year of high school work. It is expected that the high school principal will judge each case on its individual merits, but that in making his selections and recommendations he will consider such things as:

- (a) the rank held by the student in his high school class;
- (b) the results of any standardized tests which the student may have taken;
- (c) the opinion of the student's teachers regarding his aptitude for college level work; and
- (d) the opinion of the student's teachers regarding the student's having attained sufficient maturity to adjust to the social and emotional interactions involved.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by F. Guy Hitt, the Board approved the policy recommended by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

USE OF UNIVERSITY PROPERTY FOR SCHEDULED EVENTS AND MEETINGS

Southern Illinois University, aware of its responsibility to provide continuing programs of instruction, research and service to the residents of the State, maintains a diversified service program within the limitations of the facilities and resources available. The service program supports a two-way effort by which the University takes its resources into the service area and the service areas bring their resources onto the campuses.

One aspect of the University service program involves the use of University property for educational meetings, conferences, short courses, institutes, lectures, forums, concerts, exhibitions, and other educational and cultural events, providing usage of University buildings and facilities does not conflict with academic programs or with the housing of regularly enrolled students.

The Coordinators of the Information and Scheduling Centers at the Carbon-

dale and Edwardsville campuses are charged with the responsibility for maintaining a schedule of all campus events and serving as the agent through whom the scheduling of University facilities must clear or must be registered.

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt the following resolution:

Resolution

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular meeting assembled, that the following Policies Governing the Use of University Property for Scheduled Events and Meetings shall be in effect at Southern Illinois University Campuses from and after September 1, 1967, and all policies and regulations inconsistent therewith are as of this date repealed.

POLICIES GOVERNING THE USE OF UNIVERSITY PROPERTY FOR SCHEDULED EVENTS AND MEETINGS

Use of University premises is restricted to events and meetings sponsored by the following:

Colleges, Schools, Departments, and functional units of the University, and any of these units in conjunction with professionally recognized educational organizations or bona fide non-University organizations;

University recognized Student Organizations;

University allied or affiliated organizations such as the Southern Illinois University Foundation and the Southern Illinois University Alumni Association;

Non-student on-campus groups that require facilities unique to the University; Non-University groups and organizations, with approval of the appropriate University Scheduling Officer, when the event or meeting is of educational, cultural, or social significance and constitutes a desirable contribution to general community welfare.

In keeping with the traditional separation of church and state, University policy cannot permit the regular use of its premises primarily for purposes of worship.

In keeping with the traditional neutrality of State Universities in political matters, Southern Illinois University provides the free use of certain physical facilities for purposes primarily political for any political party listed on the current State ballot. The free use of these facilities is allowed on each campus of the University for not more than one meeting for each division of the party (National, State, County) during any election campaign (Primary or General). All meetings of this nature must be cleared through the elected county chairman or other appointed party official. Meetings which are scheduled and paid for, such as a dinner meeting held at the University Center, are not included in the number of meetings allowed each political party.

An admission fee may be charged or contributions solicited for events or meetings held on University premises only in accordance with University policies and regulations. Permission to charge admission fees or to solicit contributions may be granted to the following:

Recognized Student Organizations, when the proceeds from approved and properly scheduled activities are deposited into the University Agency Fund of the organization concerned, and are expended in accordance with established policies and regulations;

Faculty and Staff organizations recognized by the University, when the funds collected are for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the event or meeting, or are to be used for University scholarships, University projects, or University philanthropic programs;

University allied or affiliated organizations, when the funds collected are for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the event or meeting, or are to be used for University scholarships, University projects, or University philanthropic pro-

grams;

Non-University groups and organizations, upon approval of the appropriate University Scheduling Officer, when the funds collected are for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the event or meeting, or are to be used for University scholarships, University projects, or University philanthropic programs.

When an admission fee is collected for any event on University premises, a service charge for use of the facility is assessed. University facilities are not available to non-University organizations or individuals for presentation of public entertainment for which, from the admission fee charged, a profit is sought for the individual (s) or the organization (s) involved.

When use of University premises and facilities for special events and meetings involves unanticipated conflicts of University-wide education or cultural significance, such scheduling conflicts are subject to review and resolution by a Scheduling Review and Advisory Committee established on each campus, with provisions for representation from Faculty, Staff, Student Body, and each department or unit affected by any given conflict or problem. The Committee on each campus will be called into session in such instances at the discretion of the Coordinator of the Information and Scheduling Center.

The use of all University premises and facilities shall be subject to every

applicable Federal and State Law.

In scheduling facilities and services available at the Outdoor Laboratory at Little Grassy Lake, the University Residence Halls, the University Centers, and the University Arena, firm reservations may be granted for conventions or other events that require considerable advance planning, prior to the detailed scheduling of major University events. However, diligence is to be exercised and accountable efforts made through the Information and Scheduling Centers to determine probable dates of eligible University events during the period involved.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., the Board adopted the resolution recommended by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

She was a devoted teacher and a skillful supervisor of practice teachers.

The death of Mr. Harry Hayes Smith, Professor in the Education Division, was reported. He was born July 15, 1909, and died August 8, 1967. He received the Bachelor of Arts degree from Millikin University, the Master of Arts degree from the University of Illinois, and the Doctor of Education degree from Washington University. He taught in the East Alton-Wood River High School and served as Assistant Professor at Washington University prior to accepting appointment at Southern Illinois University in 1958, where he has been active in educational planning and research. As the first chairman of the faculty General Studies Committee, he saw the general studies program through its first critical years.

Detailed reports of such actions were mailed to the members of the Board of Trustees in advance of this meeting, and copies were placed on file in the office of the Board.

A report of purchase orders and contracts amounting to less than \$2,500, in the total amount of \$968,942.46 for Carbondale Campus and \$353,946.80 for Edwardsville Campus, awarded during July and August, 1967, was considered. Also considered were actions of the Executive Committee in approving purchase orders and contracts amounting to \$2,500 or over, in the amount of \$4,476,655.22 for Carbondale Campus and \$2,448,110.18 for Edwardsville Campus, awarded during the same period.

On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved and ratified actions of the Executive Committee, as shown in the detailed reports considered. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

EDWARDSVILLE HOUSING

Attached hereto is the proposed item to be submitted to the Board of Higher Education requesting approval of housing on the Edwardsville Campus. The housing is to consist of single student housing for 1,000 students and 250 family units.

Since this proposal represents a variation from that originally approved by the Board, it is brought back at this time for consideration. The administration was requested to explore the possibility of lease-purchase arrangements for these facilities. We did so with regard to the apartment housing, but after evaluating five different proposals it has been concluded that we cannot proceed in this manner for this project with the greatest economy.

The proposal recommended for approval to be submitted to the Board of Higher Education is predicated upon a direct bond issue by the Board of Trustees. Approval of the attached statement is requested.

(Note: The above-mentioned document is omitted here in the interest of economy; a copy is on file in the office of the Board).

On motion of Dr. Martin V. Brown, seconded by Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., the Board approved the proposal made by the administration, with the stipulation that the Board's representative to the State of Illinois Board of Higher Education be provided with complete information and supporting data concerning the proposals received for construction on a lease-purchase basis. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

ASSIGNMENT OF CONTRACT TO ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY

Pending approval of a Declaration of Public Interest by the General Assembly, authorizing the Illinois Building Authority to accomplish the completion of Morris Library, the University entered into a contract with Burnham & Hammond, Inc., in order to get an early start on the architectural planning required. For the purpose of obtaining authority to now assign this contract to the Illinois Building Authority, the following resolution is recommended for adoption at this time:

Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular meeting assembled, that assignment of University Contract 5506 with Burnham & Hammond, Inc., for architectural and engineering services for the completion of Morris Library, to the Illinois Building Authority, a body corporate and politic of the State of Illinois, in consideration of the said Illinois Building Authority assuming the obligations, duties and responsibilities of Owner as that term is therein used, be and is hereby approved, authorized and directed, and

Be It Further Resolved, that the President of the University is hereby authorized and directed to execute such documents in the name of this Board as may be necessary to accomplish such assignment.

On motion of Dr. Martin V. Brown, seconded by F. Guy Hitt, the Board adopted the resolution presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

PARKING GARAGE STUDY FOR THE EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

Previously the members of the Board of Trustees have received the Parking Garage Study prepared by Hellmuth, Obata & Kassabaum for the Edwardsville Campus. It is the recommendation of the administration that the administration be instructed to proceed with the development of specific plans for a parking garage in the vicinity of the Communications Building, and as a part of the addition to this building for which funds were provided by the last session of the General Assembly.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., the Board authorized the administration to proceed with the development of specific plans for a parking garage, Edwardsville Campus. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, Dr. Brown.

CONSIDERATION OF BIDS FOR CENTRAL PARKING LOT EXTENSIONS, EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

Bids were received on August 15 for the central parking lot extension on the Edwardsville Campus. There is presented herewith a tabulation of bids and a map showing location of Parking Lots 12 and 13. The scope of the work is as follows:

- 1. Base Bid, Parking Lot 13, with all work for 499 cars. (Shown in red on attached map)
- 2. Alternate "A" covers all work for new road adjacent to Parking Lot 13. (Shown in green on attached map)
- 3. Alternate "B" covers work for Parking Lot 12 and road east of Parking Lot, with capacity for 678 cars. (Shown in brown on attached map)
- 4. Alternate "C" covers painting in Parking Lots 12 and 13.

The construction plans for this project provide space for 499 cars in the Base Bid and 678 cars in Alternate "B", for a total of 1,177 cars. If both lots are constructed the parking capacity of the University will be increased from 2,117 spaces, or by approximately 56%. Cost of space per car for the Base Bid is approximately \$386.00; cost per space for the combination of Base Bid and Alternate "B" is \$334.00.

The following alternatives are possible courses of action:

- 1. Award Base Bid only \$193,080.60 2. Award Base Bid and Alternate "A" 246,717.40
- 3. Award Base Bid and Alternate "B" 393,778.35

4. Award Base Bid, Alternates "A" and "B"

447.415.15

5. Award Base Bid and Alternates "A", "B" and "C"

449,915.15

6. Reject all bids.

It is recommended that we accept and award the Base Bid and Alternates "A", "B" and "C" to the low bidder, Bituminous Fuel and Oil Company of Collinsville, Illinois, in the amount of \$449,915.15. The rationale for this recommendation is as follows:

- 1. Cost per space for the combined Base Bid and Alternate "B" is less expensive than is the cost per space for Base Bid only.
- 2. The ratio of parking space to current enrollment at the Edwardsville Campus is one (I) parking space for three and one-half $(3\frac{1}{2})$ students; projection of this ratio indicates that additional parking spaces provided by the Base Bid and Alternate "B" would be adequate for an enrollment of 11,500.
- 3. Based upon the parking space-enrollment ratio of one (1) parking space for three and one-half $(3\frac{1}{2})$ students, the available parking area would become critical again in 1969 if only the Base Bid were awarded; the Registrar's Office is forecasting an enrollment of 8,300 in 1969 and the 499 spaces included in the Base Bid would accommodate an enrollment of 9,000.
- 3. Construction of two lots now would also provide additional space for guests attending seminars, exhibitions, and other special events during normal daytime operations of the University.

The recommendation of the administration for acceptance and award of Base Bid and Alternates "A", "B" and "C" was set forth in a letter dated August 23, 1967. Approval of the Board is requested.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by F. Guy Hitt, the Board approved award of contract to the low bidder as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

CONSIDERATION OF BIDS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF STEAM TUNNEL BETWEEN WHAM EDUCATION BUILDING AND GENERAL CLASSROOM BUILDING, CARBONDALE CAMPUS

Bids were received on August 31, 1967, for construction of a steam tunnel parallel to old Grand Avenue between the Wham Education Building and the General Classroom Building. There is presented herewith the summary sheet and tabulation of bids indicating the engineer's estimate and the recommendation of the Carbondale Campus Architect for award of the contract to the low bidder.

The amount of the bid, \$47,500, is considerably under our estimated cost of \$63,800; however, the proposal has been reviewed by our Architect with the contractor and the contractor believes that he can accomplish the work in a satisfactory manner at the price quoted.

It is recommended that the Board accept the low Base Bid for construction of cast-in-place steam tunnel between Buildings 0044 and 0046, as follows:

Base Bid \$47,500 J & L Robinson Development & Construction Company, Inc. 606G East Main Street Carbondale, Illinois

A copy of the tabulation of proposals received was placed on file with the Secretary for deposit in the office of the Board.

On motion of F. Guy Hitt, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved acceptance of the proposal of the low bidder, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

CONSIDERATION OF BIDS FOR WATER PUMP STATION, EDWARDSVILLE GAMPUS

Attached hereto is a tabulation of bids received on September 5, 1967, for a water pump station on the Edwardsville Campus. Only two bids were received for the General Work and only one each for Mechanical, Electrical and Access Road. The bids were over estimate in varying percentages from 44% to 68%. This is the second time the project has been bid, and bids were no lower this time than on the previous occasion.

The Architect's Office has indicated that if the bids are not accepted this time the project may as well be shelved for at least a year. The engineers point out that Edwardsville Campus is entirely dependent upon one pump for all of its domestic and fire-fighting water supply. They indicate that the proposed water pump station would include a fire pump which would supply the required fire flow and would contain one other pump which would function as an additional source of domestic supply.

The University engineers also believe that the estimate prepared by the associate engineers is too low.

After consideration of all factors, it is recommended that the bids be rejected. It may be that we will need to wait a year before bidding the project again, or it may be necessary to modify the project before re-bidding it. It does not appear wise, however, to expend \$213,412.00 for the project at this time.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by F. Guy Hitt, the Board rejected all proposals received for construction of a water pump station, Edwardsville Campus, as recommended by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

GENERAL OFFICES BUILDING, EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

The Board of Higher Education for the State of Illinois adopted a policy at the time of recommending capital budgets for the institutions of higher education to the 75th General Assembly which provided that 10% of the recommended capital appropriation be held in reserve and released by the Board

when building costs justified such escalation. The original authorization (made by the 74th General Assembly) for the General Offices Building on the Edwards-ville Campus was insufficient to construct the facility finally planned and now being built. A deficiency of \$850,000 resulted. This additional amount was authorized by the 75th General Assembly. The Board of Higher Education has taken the position that \$85,000 of this deficiency is subject to the reserve policy and requires action by the Board of Higher Education for the release.

It is recommended that the following letter be authorized for transmittal to the Board of Higher Education for the release of these funds:

The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University requests that you approve the release of the 10%, or \$85,000, contingency for the General Offices Building now under construction at the Edwardsville Campus.

The original authorization to the Illinois Building Authority by the 74th General Assembly was \$2,750,000. As plans were developed it became obvious that this would not be a sufficient amount, due to increased costs and the need for additional space. Bids were taken by the Illinois Building Authority in January, 1967, and the low bid was \$4,177,254. Negotiations between the University and the low bidder resulted in a base award by the Illinois Building Authority of \$2,700,000, with an option of accepting additional work during the current biennium. This additional work consisted of:

- A. Construction of third floor
- B. Completion of basement
- C. Completion of second floor

The amount of the option was \$850,000. This amount was authorized by the 75th General Assembly, but 10% has been held subject to the approval of the Board of Higher Education.

It is therefore requested that the Illinois Building Authority be authorized to release the 10% authorization, or \$85,000.

AWARD FOR LIFE SCIENCE BUILDING, STAGE II, CARBONDALE CAMPUS

Bids were received on Tuesday, September 19, 1967, at the offices of the Illinois Building Authority for the construction of Life Science Building, Stage II. The low bid by J. L. Simmons Co., Inc., is for \$9,777,700, which exceeds the estimate by 5.97%. As can be noted from the tabulation, three bids were received and appear to be competitive.

It is necessary for the Board of Trustees to make a recommendation to the Illinois Building Authority. It is recommended that the Board request the Illinois Building Authority to award the base bid to J. L. Simmons Co., Inc., in the amount above stated. It is further recommended that the Board authorize a letter to the Board of Higher Education requesting the release of the 10% reserve in the amount of \$780,000.

A copy of the tabulation of proposals received was placed on file with the Secretary for deposit in the office of the Board.

President Morris indicated to the members of the Board that the low bidder has agreed to keep the alternates open for approximately one year, and the administration hopes to effect some savings during construction to allow acceptance of such alternates.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Dr. Martin V. Brown, the Board approved a request to the Illinois Building Authority for award of base bid to the low bidder; further, the administration was authorized to request the Board of Higher Education to approve release of the 10% reserve, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

RESOLUTION ACCEPTING BIDS FOR WUSI-TV TRANSMITTER STATION BUILDING, OLNEY, ILLINOIS

Sealed bids were opened yesterday, September 21, 1967, at 2 p.m. for construction of a building to house the transmitter for television station WUSI-TV, to be located near Olney, Illinois. Bid tabulations indicating the recommendation of the University Architect have been distributed to the Board at this meeting, and a copy has been filed with the Secretary. The total of all bids recommended for acceptance is 14.4% over the \$123,900 estimate of our design architects. The following resolution is therefore recommended for adoption at this time:

And Be It Further *Resolved*, that the bidders be so notified by the University Architect, and that, subject to compliance by bidders with the terms contained therein, contracts therefor shall be awarded to such bidders duly executed on behalf of the Board of Trustees.

On motion of Dr. Martin V. Brown, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the award of contracts as recommended by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

The Board next considered the bid of the University of Illinois to control the new senior colleges to be located at Springfield and Chicago. On motion of Vice-Chairman Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., the Board requested the administration to prepare and submit a plan for involvement in the development of these colleges. President Morris was requested to consider preparation of a policy statement expressing the University's concern and willingness to assist the new senior colleges, as well as the new junior colleges being planned.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris announced the meeting of the Association of Governing Boards, October 10–11 in Washington, D.C. Dr. Martin V. Brown was authorized by the Board to attend as the Board's representative, at University expense.

President Morris indicated that the study report on fraternities and sororities at Southern Illinois University, and the report on the condition of intercollegiate athletics, had been referred to various internal committees and councils for review. He stated that further reactions would be coming to the Board in the near future.

President Morris stated that he was proceeding with the development of intercollegiate athletics on the Edwardsville Campus in the same manner that other developments have been handled; that is, when a program was in operation on the Carbondale Campus and it was felt appropriate to duplicate such a program on the Edwardsville Campus, it was done so when and as deemed desirable by the administration. He offered the Board opportunity to object to this procedure and hearing none indicated

that a minimal number of intercollegiate sports programs would be approved for the current year.

President Morris informed the Board that the administration was entering into a study of the internal organization of the University, and that recommendations for changes should be forthcoming in the near future.

President Morris stated that the Edwardsville Campus was attempting to decide upon a mascot, and that he was inclined to approve one different than the Saluki used by the Carbondale Campus, unless there was objection from the Board. There was no objection.

President Morris asked if the Board wished to have the replacements on the land appraisal committee handled by the administration. By common consent of the Trustees it was indicated that the matter should be handled in that way. Dr. Brown asked to be advised as to such changes prior to appointment.

A summary statement of legislation enacted by the 75th General Assembly was distributed, and a copy was placed on file with the Secretary for deposit in the office of the Board. At President Morris' request, Vice-President Rendleman gave a brief summary of such legislation and answered questions from members of the Board.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:30 P.M.

APPLICATION FOR CONSTRUCTION PERMIT FOR FM RADIO STATION, EDWARDSVILLE GAMPUS

PHYSICAL SCIENCES OFFICE WING, EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

Bids were received on October 11, 1967, for the office addition to the Science Building on the Edwardsville Campus. Attached are the tabulations of the bids received.

This was the second time that the bids had been received. The low bid submitted at the June 29, 1967, opening was \$960,350. The Board, upon the recommendation of the administration, recommended to the Illinois Building Authority that these bids be rejected and they were, with the plan to reissue the project for subsequent bidding. The original low bid was \$960,350. The bids received on October 11 total \$1,019,270, which is nearly \$60,000 more than the bids received in June.

The rejection of these bids might seem to be clearly indicated for the following reasons:

- 1. The cost per square foot of \$39.67 is extremely high, in addition to which the caissons are already constructed and the mechanical work involved is not complicated.
- 2. Bids were received on a nearly identical facility for the Carbondale Campus approximately a week after the bids under consideration were received, and it would appear that the same facility in Carbondale will cost substantially less.
- 3. To have previously rejected lower bids and re-bid the project with an ensuing higher cost award might have an adverse effect upon the University's image with other contractors, although the previous bidders did not bid at the second bidding.
- 4. To award at such a high price might have an adverse effect on future bids in that contractors would assume we would accept any bid, no matter how great the premium involved.

Before taking action on this matter it is necessary, however, to consider factors weighing for an award in this situation:

- 1. The University has pressing need for the space which this facility will provide. The Science faculty are now using classrooms as offices, and with the increasing enrollment it will be necessary very shortly to use these rooms for their intended purposes.
- 2. Funds are available from authorizations made by both the 74th and 75th General Assemblies and by the Federal Government from a Higher Education Facilities Education grant to construct at the amount bid.

- 3. This would be the second time in a relatively short period in which the second bids on projects for the Edwardsville Campus had been rejected completely. This might have an adverse effect with contractors and make them reluctant to bid on future projects. The project exceeds the estimate of McKee, Berger and Mansueto by 8.8%, or \$82,420. It exceeds the estimate of Hellmuth, Obata & Kassabaum by 5.7%, or \$55,270. To accept bids exceeding the estimate by these percentages is not unusual.
- 4. Under legislation enacted by the last session of the General Assembly, if a project is not placed under contract within three years after it has been authorized by the General Assembly, this authorization is voided. Since this project was originally authorized by the 74th General Assembly, it must be under contract by July 1, 1968. The architectural firm of Hellmuth, Obata & Kassabaum recommends that if we reject bids that we do not re-bid the project for twenty-four months. This would, of course, mean the loss of the authorization and the federal funds already authorized for the project.
- 5. It is apparent from the present state of our economy that the cost of construction continues and will continue to increase so that at some future date should we reissue the job it is probable that it will cost even more than under the present bids.
- 6. It does appear that a number of competitive bids were received.
- 7. The architects point out that this project requires using large project equipment to do a relatively small project in terms of square feet. The cost would necessarily be higher because of the structuring of a job sufficient to do a large project in a constricted area.
- 8. The associate architects, the professional estimators, and our own architectural staff indicate that the possibility is between the acceptance of these bids or the cancellation of the project for the immediate future.

The final decision on an award of the contract is the responsibility of the Illinois Building Authority. This Authority will want a recommendation from the Board of Trustees. The administration recommends, in view of the great need for the facility, that this overweighs other factors and requests the Board of Trustees to recommend to the Illinois Building Authority the acceptance of the low bids.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., the Board determined to recommend to the Illinois Building Authority the acceptance of low bids, as follows:

The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none. Mr. Elliott urged that every effort be made to persuade the legislature to allow the University to award a single contract, rather than separate contracts as presently required. He also requested that the administration reexamine both internal and external factors which may be causing the University to pay premium prices on building contracts.

APPOINTMENT OF FISCAL AGENT

Several projects in the planning stage, for example, University Center (Carbondale Campus) completion and addition, parking facilities and other necessary construction require fiscal planning and consultation.

It is recommend that the Board of Trustees adopt the following resolution:

Resolution

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular meeting assembled, that A. G. Becker and Company, Chicago, Illinois, be appointed Fiscal Agent to the Board, for presently planned self-liquidating projects until this appointment is amended or revoked; and

Be It Further Resolved, That the administration of the University is authorized to enter into contracts with the said Fiscal Agent for fiscal planning and consultation for such projects at such times and under such terms and conditions as shall be judged by the administration to be in the best interest of the University.

At the request of Acting President MacVicar, Vice-President Rendleman explained that four projects are involved, namely, the parking garage and the addition and completion of University Center on the Carbondale Campus, and housing and the parking garage on the Edwardsville Campus.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board adopted the resolution presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

APPROVAL OF LEASES WITH ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY

The subject leases are for the purpose of repaying the Illinois Building Authority for funds expended at the request of Southern Illinois University on matters declared to be in the public interest by the General Assembly. These are permanent leases based on the now known cost of construction, and will replace interim leases based on estimated costs. The following resolution authorizing execution of such leases is recommended for adoption at this time:

Resolution

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular session assembled that the following leases by and between the Board and the Illinois Building Authority, a body politic and corporate of the State of Illinois, for construction of a Life Science Building Phase II at Carbondale (Project IBA 75-19) and the General Office Building at Edwardsville (Project IBA 74-18), which leases are in words and figures as follows:

(Leases are on hand for signature by the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Trustees, and they may be examined if so desired; such leases are omitted here in the interest of economy).

be and are hereby approved as to form, content and dollar amount.

And Be It Further Resolved That the Chairman and Secretary of this Board of Trustees be and are hereby authorized and directed to execute leases with the aforesaid Illinois Building Authority in the form, content and dollar amounts set forth in the leases approved above, and to make delivery of such executed leases to the said Illinois Building Authority, and to do and perform the above act as the acts of this Board of Trustees.

On motion of Dr. Martin V. Brown, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted the resolution presented by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

FINAL CONTRACT AWARD FOR LIFE SCIENCE BUILDING, PHASE II, CARBONDALE CAMPUS

On September 22, 1967, the Board of Trustees authorized a request to the Illinois Building Authority to award the base bid of \$9,777,700 to the low bidder, J. L. Simmons Company, Inc. Additive Alternates were to be considered following award of base bid. The Illinois Building Authority and Health, Education and Welfare require a selection of Additive Alternates and a final budget prior to contract award. It is necessary for the Board of Trustees to make a recommendation of acceptance of base bid and Additive Alternates.

It is recommended that the Board request the Illinois Building Authority to award the base bid of \$9,777,700 to J. L. Simmons Company, Inc., including Additive Alternates in the amount of \$450,150, for a total contract award of \$10,227,850.

Attached is a Summary Sheet, dated October 6, 1967, which covers the base bid and Additive Alternates as mentioned above. A budget has been submitted, which shows adequate funds to cover the construction as recommended. A copy of the Summary Sheet has been placed on file in the office of the Board.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., the Board authorized request to the Illinois Building Authority to award base bid plus additive alternates, totaling \$10,227,850, to the low bidder, J. L. Simmons Company, Inc. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

PHYSICAL SCIENCES OFFICE AND AUDITORIUM WING, CARBONDALE CAMPUS

Bids were received on October 19 for the office and auditoria addition to the Physical Sciences Building on the Carbondale Campus. Attached are the tabulations of bids received. We recommend acceptance of the low bids for the project, as follows:

The total recommended contract award of \$2,077,883 is 11.39% below the cost estimated by McKee, Berger and Mansueto of \$2,344,872.

It is to be noted that Ralph Vancil, Inc., of Cairo, Illinois, submitted the low bid for heating, air conditioning, ventilation and temperature control of \$889,885. He has, however, notified the Illinois Building Authority that he made an error in his bid and wishes it withdrawn. It would appear that since he is 30% below the next low bidder and is approximately 45% below the estimate, that he did in fact commit an error in the submission of his bid and is entitled legally to ask for it to be withdrawn as a mistake.

We do not recommend an award on equipment at this time.

On motion of F. Guy Hitt, seconded by Dr. Martin V. Brown, the Board authorized recommendation to the Illinois Building Authority for award of contracts as recommended by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

UNIVERSITY CENTER BALLROOM AND SECOND FLOOR COMPLETION, EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

Bids were received November 3, 1967, for completion of the ballroom and second floor of the University Center, Edwardsville Campus. Acting President MacVicar presented a tabulation of proposals received, with a recommendation that contracts be awarded to the low bidders, as follows:

Vice-President Rendleman explained that no proposals were received for plumbing work, and that this portion of the construction was to be re-bid, with proposals to be opened November 20, 1967. He indicated that if such proposals are not acceptable, the plumbing work could be let as an extra to an existing contract or the work performed by University forces. Dr. Brown indicated that he could foresee many difficulties if such work were performed by University employees.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board accepted the low bids as indicated on the tabulation. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, Dr. Brown.

A copy of the tabulation was placed on file with the Secretary for deposit in the office of the Board.

AUTHORIZATION FOR EXTRA ON EXISTING CONTRACT

Acting President MacVicar indicated that the administration felt considerable time might be saved by modification of the contract for road construction, Edwardsville Campus, in preparation for projects to be bid next year. At his request, Vice-President Rendleman explained that the 75th General Assembly had authorized funds to build the second lane of Campus Drive, extending to the highway, and also to build an extension up to the \$2,000,000 state improvement from Route 149. He stated that the contractor is presently moving and stockpiling dirt, much of which will be needed for fill when road construction to the north is begun. He stated that the contractor had agreed to place this dirt where it would eventually be needed at a cost of 57ϕ per cubic yard. He further stated that by modifying the present contract with an extra amounting to \$117,000, both construction jobs could be accomplished at a great saving of time.

On motion of F. Guy Hitt, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board authorized the administration to modify the existing contract by award-

ing an extra in the amount indicated. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

GOVERNANCE OF NEW SENIOR COLLEGES

Chairman Sturgis called upon Vice Presidents MacVicar and Rendleman to discuss the occurrences since the last Board meeting regarding the Board's request to assist in the development and operation of the new Springfield and Chicago senior colleges.

Mr. MacVicar stated that the administration had made a presentation to the Board of Higher Education regarding governance and other matters relative to the two new senior institutions, and it had been submitted to a special subcommittee. He stated that certain decisions made by the subcommittee will be recommended to the Board of Higher Education. The subcommittee had decided upon a specific location for the Chicago institution and a general location outside the city limits for the Springfield institution; further, they had decided that these institutions would serve only junior, senior and master's degree levels. He pointed out that this meant the new institutions would not be comprehensive ones and as a result would differ from the institutions of the Southern Illinois University system. He indicated he felt that the proper posture of the University was to continue its interest in the developmental phases, but that final assignment should be made to a system which was more compatible with the limited mission which has been established for the new institution.

On motion of Dr. Martin V. Brown, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted the following resolution:

Resolution

The Board of Trustees recommends to the Board of Higher Education and to the subcommittee considering functions, location and governance of the two new institutions, that the assignment for governance be made to a system which would be compatible with the type of institution being recommended for the Springfield and Chicago areas; that the development phase for one of these institutions for a period of five years, to September, 1972, be assigned to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, with the ultimate assignment being made in the manner suggested above.

The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

MEDICAL EDUCATION

Vice-President MacVicar noted that the Board of Higher Education had established a commission to assess the need and study the possibilities of expanded medical education in Illinois. The commission since that time has been requesting various public and private schools within the state for their plans for expanded medical education if additional resources were made available. This commission has now made request of Southern Illinois University for its proposal.

Mr. MacVicar said he did not wish formal endorsement of the approach which the administration believed it would submit, but he did outline what would be a "medical school without walls." It would be extremely different from the conventional type and would involve campuses already established which have capabilities in the biological, physical, and behavioral sciences, and would for its clinical aspects utilize hospital beds already in existence throughout the entire state.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

Vice-President Rendleman indicated to the members of the Board that at the December meeting a plan would be presented involving massive physical changes at the Carbondale Campus. He stated that the proposal would involve renovation of Shryock Auditorium, remodeling Parkinson Laboratory, construction of a Humanities Building, and would also involve Woody Hall, the President's Home, and the President's Office. He indicated that funds are currently available for the proposal to be submitted to the Board.

Dr. Brown and other members of the Board indicated that immediate action should be taken regarding studies recently completed concerning athletics, including stadium location, athletic scholarships, conference affiliation, and financing.

Acting President MacVicar indicated that Vice-Presidents MacVicar, Rendleman, Ruffner, and Tenney would prepare for President Morris' review a proposal concerning all of these subjects. He further indicated that the proposal would be submitted to the Board of Trustees for consideration and action at the earliest possible meeting following President Morris' return to the campus.

There being no more business before the Board it was duly moved and seconded that the meeting be adjourned, and upon call of the question the Vice-Chairman declared that the motion had carried *viva voce*.

A report was presented for information to the members of the Board, showing the total number of degrees conferred to date. A copy of this report was placed on file with the Secretary for deposit in the office of the Board.

On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board approved and ratified the report of June and September, 1967, graduates.

MAJOR CARBONDALE CAMPUS RELOCATIONS

As was indicated at the November 9 meeting of the Board of Trustees, major physical changes are necessitated on the Carbondale Campus for the accommodation of new buildings. The following are recommended to the Board for approval:

1. The Humanities and Social Sciences Building, a proposed \$7,850,000 structure, has been tentatively sited west of the Allyn Building and Parkinson Laboratory, east of Thompson Woods, north of the University Center, and south of the former Baptist Foundation. The size of the structure is such that when construction commences it will be necessary to relocate the following functions: (a) President's Office, (b) President's Home, (c) Stenographic Service, (d) Registrar, (e) Bursar, (f) Graduate School, (g) Department of English, (h) Central Information and Scheduling Office, (i) Music Department Offices.

The proposed site location of the new building appears to lend itself to the cohesiveness of the campus and although the discommoding of certain functions will be occasioned, it appears that for the long-term development of the University the site selected is desirable. It is proposed that a representative of the firm of Geddes, Brecher, Qualls and Cunningham will be available at the meeting to present and discuss the preliminary plans for the project.

2. An appropriation of \$1,200,000 was provided by the last session of the General Assembly for renovating Shryock Auditorium. The remodeling will take at least one year and during that period of time events normally scheduled for this facility will need to be scheduled elsewhere. In addition, the offices now housed in this facility, including the Dean of the School of Fine Arts, Department of Music, and Auxiliary Enterprises will need to be accommodated.

- 3. An appropriation of approximately \$500,000 was provided which will be available for the renovation of Parkinson Laboratory. Parkinson Laboratory is presently utilized by the Departments of Physics and Chemistry. When the Physical Sciences Building, Stage I, is completed, the Department of Chemistry will occupy most of this facility and it is proposed that Parkinson Laboratory be used by the Departments of Physics and Geology. It is proposed that the renovation of this facility will include air conditioning, an elevator, and an increase in the electrical capacity to accommodate research needs. Other minor renovations will take place. It is hoped that the utilization of the building will not be discontinued although somewhat disrupted during the period of the renovation.
- 4. Funds were provided by the last General Assembly which will be available for the completion of the remodeling of Anthony Hall. The building was partially remodeled in 1962, but not the south wing, which had been the dining room and kitchen when it was a dormitory. It is proposed that the President's Office and the Vice-Presidents' Offices, plus the Board of Trustees Office, will be moved into the entire building and that the previously uncompleted renovation will be commenced shortly. The relocation of the President's Office and the Board of Trustees Office is necessitated by the construction of the Humanities and Social Sciences Building.

5. The Board has previously approved plans for addition to and completion of the unfinished portion of the University Center. It appears that in early spring, 1968, this work can commence. This space to be completed has been used in unfinished condition by the following agencies: (a) Sectioning, (b) Liberal Arts and Sciences Academic Advisement, (c) General Studies Academic Advisement, (d) University Press, (e) Film Production.

Obviously, during construction it will be necessary to relocate these offices, and this construction will occur during much of the time that the other work out-

lined above is proceeding.

- 6. At the close of the present academic year the outstanding revenue bonds issued for Woody Hall can be retired with funds available in that account, plus approximately \$38,000 which can be funded from local accounts. It is recommended that these bonds be redeemed and that Woody Hall be used by the various agencies mentioned before which will necessarily need to be relocated as a result of the building programs indicated. Not only will it serve a most useful purpose in providing office space for these agencies, but it would also remove 422 dormitory spaces from the market which are relatively antiquated in the same year that the University makes available 1,600 additional beds in the Brush Towers project.
- 7. It will be necessary to relocate the President's Home. Plans are being prepared and will be presented at a later time for a new official residence to be located southwest of the Campus Lake and south of the second Loop Road.

Mr. Charles Pulley, University Architect, introduced Mr. Robert L. Geddes of the firm of Geddes, Brecher, Qualls and Cunningham, planners for the central campus area, as well as the proposed Humanities and Social Sciences Building. Mr. Geddes reviewed the objectives and goals considered in terms of designing pleasant and efficient buildings, planning for future expansions, circulation plans for vehicle and pedestrian traffic and delivery service, and preservation of the character of the existing campus environment. Using a scale model of the central campus, Mr. Geddes indicated the proposed location for the first phase of construction of a Humanities and Social Sciences Building; alternative locations for future expansions of the building; and alternative locations for expansion of Morris Library.

Vice-President Rendleman indicated, in response to a question, that expansion of Morris Library would be high on the priority list of requests to the next session of the legislature.

On motion of Ray Page, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board approved modification of the Carbondale Master Plan and proposed major relocations and projects, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard.

GRANT OF EASEMENT FOR BURIED TELEPHONE CABLE, MC LAFFERTY ROAD AND SOUTHWARDS

General Telephone Company has requested an easement for a buried telephone cable from the intersection of Chautauqua Street and McLafferty Road southwards across University property. The cable will serve the Family Housing Phase III project as well as any future housing south of Campus Lake. Subject to final approval of route and surface rights by the administration, authorization to make this grant is recommended as follows:

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular meeting assembled, that the Acting President of the University is hereby authorized and directed to execute in the name of the said Board of Trustees an easement in favor of the General Telephone Company of Illinois for a buried cable and necessary appurtenances to be located generally along a route from the intersection of Chautauqua Street and McLafferty Road southwardly and through the Carbondale Campus, into and past the Family Housing, Phase III, site, to the south limits of the said campus, reserving unto the said Board of Trustees such rights as may be reasonably required for proper preservation and future development of the said campus and the community.

PHYSICAL SCIENCES OFFICE AND AUDITORIUM WING LABORATORY FURNITURE AND FIXTURES, CARBONDALE CAMPUS

Bids were received on October 19, 1967, for the Physical Sciences Office and Auditorium Wing for the Carbondale Campus. At that time the Board recommended the low bidders for the general, plumbing, heating, air-conditioning, ventilating and electrical work. Upon the recommendation of the administration the award for the equipment for this facility was not recommended. Since that time there have been negotiations which permit the recommendation to be made.

Attached are the tabulations of the bids received. We recommend acceptance of the low bid for this project as follows:

The total recommended contract award of \$849,382.85 is 19.63% above the estimate by Earl L. Walls & Associates and Hellmuth, Obata & Kassabaum. This new total price is the result of the acceptance of Deductive Alternate No. 1 in the amount of \$32,764.40 which covers the omission of patented extension glides and the substitution of drawers fully supported on rails on cabinet division frames. It is possible to save an additional \$92,597.75 by making certain modifications to the cabinet work, omission of certain locks and use of standard sectional shelving in certain rooms. The Chemistry Department, Hellmuth, Obata & Kassabaum, and Earl L. Walls & Associates all concur in modifications which we feel do not reduce the quantity of furniture to be installed in laboratories and research offices, nor does it affect the overall quality of the total installation.

The firms of Hellmuth, Obata & Kassabaum and Earl L. Walls & Associates agree that their cost estimate was at least 20% below a fair price for this work. The new total price of \$849,382.85 is recommended for acceptance by the Board of Trustees for award to the E. H. Sheldon Equipment Company, 9216 Clayton Road, St. Louis, Missouri 63124.

APPROVAL OF INTERIM LEASES WITH ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY

In order to support the disbursement of monies appropriated to pay rental to the Illinois Building Authority for projects authorized by the Seventy-fifth General Assembly, it is necessary to enter into lease agreements. The Authority is or will be borrowing money for the interim financing of these projects, and is authorized by law to enter into such leases contemporaneously with any financing. In order for these projects to proceed there is required to be a request from the Board to the Authority that it provide such projects, and authority to sign interim leases presently and other documents as they become necessary. The following resolution is therefore recommended for adoption at this time:

WHEREAS, the Illinois Building Authority, a body corporate and politic of the State of Illinois created by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois is empowered to acquire by purchase or otherwise, construct, complete, remodel, maintain, and equip any and all buildings and other facilities as the General Assembly by law declares to be in the public interest;

WHEREAS, in accordance with the Illinois Building Authority Act the 75th General Assembly of the State of Illinois has declared the following Southern

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, a body corporate and politic of the State of Illinois, will be requested by the Illinois Building Authority to enter into leases, transfer jurisdiction of real estate and take other actions to carry out and complete the above projects in accordance with the Illinois Building Authority Act; now, therefore, be it and it is hereby resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University as follows:

That the Chairman and Secretary of this Board of Trustees be, and they hereby are, authorized to execute, acknowledge, and deliver in the name and on behalf of this corporation such instruments of transfer, conveyance, lease, contract, and other documents as are necessary or appropriate in order to provide for the carrying out of the foregoing projects and facilities by the Illinois Building Authority.

CORRECTED TRANSFER OF SITE AND LEASE OF GENERAL OFFICE BUILDING, EDWARDSVILLE

At the last Board meeting, on November 9, 1967, the Board authorized transfers of jurisdiction of land for Physical Science Building Addition and General Office Building, both at Edwardsville, and a lease of the General Office Building. Inadvertently the same legal description had been incorporated in each of the transfer forms furnished to us, resulting in transferring the Physical Science site twice and the other not at all, and in the Physical Science site description appearing in the General Office Building lease. For the purpose of ratifying the correction of the transfer and lease for the General Office Building to include the site intended to be transferred and leased, the following resolution is recommended for adoption at this time:

Resolution

Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular session assembled, that the corrected transfer of jurisdiction of the below-described site for the General Office Building, IBA No. 74-18 at the Edwardsville Campus to the Illinois Building Authority, a body corporate and politic of the State of Illinois, and a corrected description to be inserted in the lease of the said General Office Building from the said Illinois Building Authority, be and are hereby approved:

Two parcels of land located in United States Survey 587, Claim 928, Township 4 North, Range 8 West of the Third Principal Meridian more particularly described as follows:

Parcel #1: From the center of Section 15, measure South 77°-38'-47" West a distance of 6,293.25 feet to the Point of Beginning of the tract hereinafter described, which said beginning point has the coordinates of South 10,480.00, West 107,334.00; thence East from said beginning point a distance of 287.0 feet; thence South a distance of 95.0 feet; thence West a distance of 23.0 feet; thence South a distance of 47.0 feet; thence West a distance of 67.0 feet; thence South a distance of 13.0 feet; thence West a distance of 103.0 feet; thence South a distance of 29.0 feet; thence West a distance of 94.0 feet; thence North a distance of 184.0 feet to the Point of Beginning, in Madison County, Illinois.

Parcel #2: Also an easement for ingress and egress to the above tract more fully described as follows: From the Northwest corner of the above described tract, which said point has the coordinates of South 10,480.00, West 107,334.00, measure East along the North line of the above described tract a distance of 114.0 feet to the POINT OF BEGINNING of the easement hereinafter described; thence East from said beginning point along the North line of the above described tract a distance of 40.0 feet; thence North a distance of 43.49 feet to a point on the face of the curb on Hairpin Drive; thence North 86°-10'-52" West along said curb line a distance of 40.05 feet; thence South a distance of 46.16 feet to the POINT OF BEGININNG, in Madison County, Illinois. (The bearings used in the above description are referenced to the University Coordinate System).

And Be It Further Resolved, That the Chairman and Secretary of this Board be and are hereby authorized and directed to execute in the name of the Board a formal document of transfer of jurisdiction, of lease, and any and all other documents needful or desirable to effectuate the said transfer and lease.

On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board adopted the resolution presented by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard.

DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENTS, CARBONDALE CAMPUS

Bids were received on November 28, 1967, for drainage improvements south of the Arena on the Carbondale Campus. It is proposed to encase the creek which traverses south of the present parking lot in pipe and cover it with dirt so that another parking lot of capacity equal to the present one can be built.

Bids were received on three bases: (1) 12 gauge corrugated aluminum pipe, (2) 12 gauge corrugated galvanized steel pipe, (3) Class II reinforced concrete pipe. The low bid for galvanized steel pipe was \$81,333. The architects recommend the acceptance of the low bid for reinforced concrete pipe in the amount of \$93,944, or \$12,611 more than the steel pipe. The reasons for their recommendations are:

1. The average life of the corrugated metal pipe is 30 to 40 years, while the anticipated life of the concrete pipe is at least 100 years.

2. The 48-inch corrugated steel pipe would have a capacity of 46,000,000 gallons flow, while the concrete pipe of the same size has a design flow of 86,000,000 gallons per day.

3. The concrete pipe is more nearly self-cleaning due to its smooth interior and

should under normal conditions require less maintenance in the future.

The bid tabulation is attached. The administration concurs with the recommendation of the architects and recommends the award to the low bidder using concrete pipe.

A copy of the tabulation of proposals received was placed on file with the Secretary for deposit in the office of the Board.

On motion of F. Guy Hitt, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board approved award of contract to the low bidder for installation of reinforced concrete pipe, Edgar Stephens & Sons, Inc., in the amount of \$93,944.00. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard.

ACCEPTANCE OF GIFT OF DC-3 AIRCRAFT

General Motors Corporation has generously donated a DC-3 aircraft in exceptional condition through the Southern Illinois University Foundation. For registration and insurance purposes it seems best for the Foundation to transfer title to the Board of Trustees, and the following resolution is therefore recommended for adoption at this time:

Resolution

WHEREAS, the General Motors Corporation has donated to the Southern Illinois University Foundation one certain Douglas DC-3 aircraft, SLC3G Serial No. 9058, Registration Marks N5106X, for use in Air Force R.O.T.C., Air Transportation and Aviation Technology by Southern Illinois University, and

Whereas, the said Foundation under its Constitution must transfer to the University such gifts as may properly be so transferred, subject to approval by the Board of Trustees of any conditions attached thereto; now therefore,

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular meeting assembled that the above donation be, and hereby is, accepted for the purposes and under the conditions above stated, with the thanks of the Board to both the donor and the Foundation.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Dr. Martin V. Brown, the Board adopted the resolution presented by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board adopted by unanimous vote a statement of tribute to Wayne A. Johnston, deceased. A copy of such tribute is on file in the office of the Board.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

Acting President MacVicar spoke briefly to the members of the Board concerning the unusual stress being experienced by every educational institution in the nation, and the turmoil and protests occurring on many campuses. He indicated that because he felt there existed no adequate policy statement concerning such problems and their handling by the University, an *ad hoc* committee composed of faculty members, administrators, and students was to be created. He further indicated that this committee would develop a statement of policy and a procedure for implementation of such policy.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Ray Page expressed his view that the right of dissent cannot be questioned, but dissent when it is not within the framework of the law cannot be tolerated. Mr. Page indicated that his appeal would be made to all public governing boards in the State of Illinois.

Both Acting President MacVicar and Mr. Page expressed praise of the conduct of students on the Carbondale and Edwardsville campuses and stressed the value of providing free discussion on controversial issues.

Copies of a report entitled "A plan for Innovation in Education for the Health Professions" were distributed to the members of the Board, and a copy was placed on file with the Secretary for deposit in the Board office.

Acting President MacVicar indicated that the report was submitted on behalf of the University by the office of the Vice-President for Academic Affairs; it is not an official policy of the University or the Board. He further indicated that the report had been submitted to the Planning Committee for Education in the Health Fields, following their request to the University for a proposal for expansion of medical education in the state. The report was presented for information of the members of the Board, and no action was requested.

Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, at the request of Acting President MacVicar, briefly outlined the work of the Athletics Commission which led to a report submitted May 9, 1967, concerning intercollegiate athletics. He reported that the University Council had requested the Faculty Council, the Graduate Council, and the Student Council to submit recommendations; these bodies will submit their studies and recommendations in January, 1968.

Acting President MacVicar reported briefly concerning increased support for athletics, resulting from one of the principal recommendations made by the Athletic Commission's report. He further indicated that intercollegiate athletics on both campuses was being furthered in a variety of ways.

Various members of the Board expressed dissatisfaction with the length of time it has taken to produce the Council reports and requested that copies of such reports be forwarded to them for study and information. Acting President MacVicar agreed that copies of the various Council reports would be forwarded to the members of the Board as received.

Vice-President Rendleman presented a request for authorization to expend \$3,000 for the gymnasium at the Alton Center. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, approval for the expenditure was granted. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; absent, Mr. Page.

There being no further business before the Board it was duly moved and seconded that the meeting be adjourned, and upon call of the question the Chairman declared that the motion had carried *viva voce*.

January 19, 1968

THE JANUARY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board, Carbondale Campus, on Friday, January 19, 1968, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman Kenneth L. Davis, Dr. Martin V. Brown, Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., Harold R. Fischer, F. Guy Hitt, Melvin C. Lockard, Lindell W. Sturgis. Mr. Page was absent.

Also present were Vice-President Robert W. MacVicar, Vice-President John S. Rendleman, Vice-President Ralph W. Ruffner, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Budget Director Clifford R. Burger, Legal Counsel C. Richard Gruny, Director of University News Services William H. Lyons, Assistant Director of University News Services C. A. Frazer, University Photographer Robert W. Stokes; reporters Ben Gelman, The Southern Illinoisan, Judy Ronzio, Edwardsville Intelligencer, John Epperheimer, The Daily Egyptian, David Margulies, WSIU-TV, and Mrs. Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented minutes of a regular meeting held December 9, 1967, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of F. Guy Hitt, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, these minutes were approved as presented.

By secret ballot, in accordance with Part II, Article II, Section I of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, the following members of the Board were elected to serve as officers until their successors are elected and qualified: Kenneth L. Davis, Chairman; Lindell W. Sturgis, Vice-Chairman; Melvin C. Lockard, Secretary. Mr. Robert L. Gallegly was elected to serve as Treasurer.

In accordance with Part II, Article III, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, the following members of the Board were elected to serve as members of the Executive Committee: Harold R. Fischer and Dr. Martin V. Brown. As stated in the By-Laws, the third member of the Executive Committee shall be the Chairman of the Board.

The Board took further action to re-elect F. Guy Hitt to serve on the Board of Trustees, State Universities Retirement System; to elect Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., to serve on the Merit Board, University Civil Service System; and to re-elect Melvin C. Lockard to serve on the Board of Directors,

Southern Illinois University Foundation, with term expiring in June, 1971. Mr. Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., was elected to serve the remaining two years of Kenneth L. Davis' term on the Foundation Board of Directors, and Mr. Davis will continue to serve as an ex-officio member.

Chairman Kenneth L. Davis reappointed Melvin C. Lockard to serve as his alternate to the Illinois State Board of Higher Education.

On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by F. Guy Hitt, the Board formally expressed its appreciation for Mr. Lockard's services in the past as the Board's representative on the Board of Higher Education, and confidence in his work in the future.

Matters Presented by Acting President MacVicar

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

INCLUSION OF DATA ON RACE IN UNIVERSITY RECORDS

Under Federal Executive Order 11246 (9/24/65) and like previous rulings the University has been reporting the racial makeup of its staff for many years. We are required to do this under some of our Federal Contracts. Over the years these reports (now called EEO-1) have grown somewhat more detailed, and now include sex as well as race, but they have always permitted acquisition of data by visual review as well as by records made after initial employment. It has not been the practice at this University to keep any records indicating the race of employees.

Now the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has advised that we must make a report to them on the racial makeup of the student body to be served by any facility, such as the Life Science Building Stage II, for which a Federal grant has been made. This report will be almost impossible to complete without noting race in student records. Practically, we cannot by visual review report how many of what race apply for admission, are enrolled, receive athletic scholarships, live on campus, get student loans, are enrolled in ROTC, become foreign students, participate in student affairs, etc. Indeed, it has become burdensome to do this for employees for the EEO-1 report. The Department agreed to accept estimates for last fall's report, but says that "exact data for the 1968–69 school year will be expected." Whether the Department could withdraw our eligibility for Federal grants if we did not meet this expectation is problematic, but is threatened.

Because of the burdens and pressures generated by those who wish the University to commence recording racial data, the Board is asked to review our policy in this area and approve one of our alternative courses of action, which seem to be:

1. Continue the practice of keeping no notation of race in student records or employee records.

2. Keep no racial records unless and until Health, Education and Welfare establish their right to force us to do so for students.

3. Keep racial records of student body makeup, but continue employee re-

ports by visual review.

4. Note race in student records, and note racial statistics of employees in other than their basic personnel records, as recommended by the Federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

5. Commence keeping records of race for all, with all safeguards against mis-

use that can be devised.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board authorized the administration to maintain the minimum amount of records on race and other data as may be required by Federal and State agencies, and that an annual report be made to the Board of Trustees concerning any problems encountered in these matters. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

CHANGES IN FACULTY-ADMINISTRATIVE PAYROLL

The following additions and changes were reported and approval requested:

DEATH

The death of Mr. Robert D. Faner, Professor of English, was reported. Mr. Faner was born July 12, 1906, and died December 14, 1967. He received the Bachelor of Arts degree from Allegheny College, the Master of Arts degree from the State University of Iowa, and the Doctor of Philosophy degree from the University of Pennsylvania. He had served as Instructor at the University of Oregon prior to accepting appointment at Southern Illinois University in 1930. Professor Faner was recognized by both his students and his colleagues on the faculty as an outstanding teacher and scholar, able to communicate knowledge and to arouse enthusiasm for it.

CONTINUING APPOINTMENTS

TRAFFIC AND PARKING REVENUE FUND

The provision of adequate parking facilities on the Carbondale Campus continues to be a problem. Although several new lots have been added recently, they will to a considerable extent only replace parking areas lost under new construction and driveway parking lost with the removal of the houses served. With the gathering together of formerly scattered academic offices into permanent buildings within Loop Road there has been a commensurate increase in demand for central campus parking. Very soon the density of land use will require multi-level parking, which multiplies the cost per parking space.

While we will always have to divert some University resources for parking and traffic control, it is felt that the users of such facilities should begin to bear more of their cost. Not only is the drain on our funds becoming disproportionate, but if we were to try to furnish all the free parking spaces that people would like, most of the campus would have to be paved. It is believed that attaching some cost to parking on campus will eliminate many unnecessary vehicles and

make space for some needed ones. This will also permit creation of a special fund which can be used not only directly but also to supplement or support revenue bonds for future facilities.

Recommendations for user charges to be imposed are still being studied. At this time assurance is sought that the Board concurs with the above approach, and if it does that the following resolution establishing the Traffic and Parking Revenue Fund be enacted as the first step in creating a partially self-liquidating parking system:

Resolution

Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular meeting assembled, that effective immediately all vehicle decal fees, parking fees, traffic fines, any new user charges when approved, and all other revenue attributable to campus traffic or parking shall be paid into a separate account to be called the Traffic and Parking Revenue Fund, which fund shall be used for costs connected with campus parking and traffic control either by direct expenditure or by pledge of its assets or its future revenues or both to future expenditure for such costs.

Vice-President Rendleman indicated that although the item above referred to the parking facilities on the Carbondale Campus, the establishment of the fund was intended to cover both campuses and to support revenue bond issues for parking facilities at both Edwardsville and Carbondale. He further indicated that there would be need to make the parking facilities appurtenant to some other revenue-producing facility, the cost of which would also need to be covered by revenue bonds.

WAIVER OF COPYRIGHT POLICY

For twenty-eight years Professor Paul Schilpp has been producing a distinguished series of works entitled the "Library of Living Philosophers." Twelve volumes are now in print and two more in preparation. He has had little financial help in this project, in recent years in the neighborhood of \$1,000 per year. All royalty income from previous volumes is reported to have been directed into a not-for-profit corporation to be expended for the cost of future volumes.

Last year and this year University support, from both a National Endowment for the Humanities grant and from our local research accounts, have permitted Professor Schilpp to greatly increase his effort and his production. The former has offered to the University a grant of \$15,000 for this project for April, 1968, to April, 1969, and the University plans to devote \$12,310 additional to it over this period. Present policy of the Board of Trustees (1954–55 Annual Report pp. 25–27) declares the financial interest of the Board in half the royalties of any copyright resulting from a project supported by as much as \$1,500 in any one year, or \$5,000 over the life of the project. Professor Schilpp requests that this policy be waived in his case, and that full copyright and royalty rights be vested in his not-for-profit corporation for books produced by means of our financial support, just as it has been for the previous volumes almost wholly produced by his own efforts. Such royalties will be used for future books for which there might not be grants available.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board waived the copyright policy, as requested by Professor Paul Schilpp. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

POLICY FOR RELATIONS WITH JUNIOR COLLEGES

In January, 1958, the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University adopted a policy of cooperation with junior colleges. This policy was largely directed toward the encouragement of the establishment of junior colleges. Since that time, the State of Illinois has embarked upon an extensive program involving the establishment and support of junior colleges throughout the State, and as of this date some thirty-three new Class I junior colleges are in existence. The University recognizes the importance of this development and the extent to which the University will be required in the future to accept transfer students from these new institutions. Approval is therefore requested for this statement as an official policy of the University:

southern illinois university believes that the junior colleges of this State are assuming a vital role as a new social agency to provide for the higher education needs of the people of the State through the provision of additional opportunities in vocational and technical education, in general education, in adult education and community services, and in the education of those who will transfer for further work to other colleges and universities. It shall be the policy of Southern

Illinois University to do everything within its power to encourage and facilitate the work of the junior colleges along these lines.

The UNIVERSITY stands ready to cooperate with the junior colleges in order to assure that the work done both in the junior colleges and in the University is of the highest quality possible. It shall be an objective of the University to encourage close relationships with the junior colleges in order to develop the highest practicable degree of articulation between the two systems. The University will make both its facilities and its personnel available to work with the junior colleges insofar as this is possible.

On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by Dr. Martin V. Brown, the Board approved the statement presented as an official policy of the University. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

Acting President MacVicar presented enrollment figures for Winter Quarter, 1968, which showed 18,500 students enrolled at Carbondale Campus and 8,080 at Edwardsville Campus, an increase of 8.7% over Winter Quarter, 1967. He emphasized the fact that these were not final figures.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:30 A.M.

February 16, 1968

THE FEBRUARY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the President's Staff Office, Edwardsville Campus, on Friday, February 16, 1968, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

The Vice-Chairman presented minutes of a regular meeting held January 19, 1968, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of F. Guy Hitt, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, these minutes were approved as presented.

Dr. Brown indicated to the Board that Mr. Timothy W. Swain, Chairman of the Merit Board, University Civil Service System of Illinois, had requested his presence at a reorganization meeting of the Merit Board. He requested the Board's authority to attend the meeting with Mr. Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., the Board's newly elected representative. On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by F. Guy Hitt, the Board authorized Dr.

Brown to attend the meeting at University expense. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; present, Dr. Brown; nay, none.

Dr. Brown stated that the University of Illinois Board of Trustees had authorized miniatures of a Lorado Taft statue as a memento for Board members and suggested that something similar might be appropriate for Southern Illinois University. Acting Chairman Lindell W. Sturgis appointed President Morris, Vice-President MacVicar, and Vice-President Ruffner to look into the matter and report back to the Board.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

PRESENTATION OF PLANS FOR PHYSICAL EDUCATION BUILDING, EDWARDS-VILLE CAMPUS

Mr. William L. Flippo and Mr. Wayne Enderling of William L. Flippo & Associates, Alton, Illinois, entered the meeting at this time to present the preliminary plans for the Physical Education Building, Edwardsville Campus. A brochure containing drawings of site location, traffic flow, proposed use plans for levels 1 through 4, exterior elevations, and preliminary specifications was presented to each member of the Board. A copy of this brochure was placed on file with the Secretary for deposit in the office of the Board.

Mr. Flippo indicated that the proposed building was designed to accommodate 1,000 students for physical education instruction, and that his firm was presently programming Phase I to handle 500 students. He also indicated that Interurban Trace will carry the student flow to the building from the north, with a pedestrian way to the south connecting with the southwest connector to Circle Drive, with these two entries on different levels. He further indicated that the noise areas are planned on a slab on grade, with research and administration offices on the upper two levels. The exterior will be of brick and glass to blend with existing buildings in the central academic core.

Various questions concerning the size of the proposed building, the distance from the central buildings, and future expansions were answered by members of the administration.

On motion of Dr. Martin V. Brown, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board approved the preliminary plans as presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

President Morris and Mr. Sturgis thanked the architects for the presentation, and they left the meeting at this time.

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PRESENTATION OF PLANS FOR FAMILY HOUSING PROJECT I, EDWARDS-VILLE CAMPUS

Mr. Donald Blivas of Blivas and Page, Architects, Chicago, Illinois, entered the meeting to present preliminary plans for Family Housing Project I, Edwardsville Campus. He was introduced to the members of the Board by Vice-President Rendleman, who indicated that a housing committee for Edwardsville Campus had decided on a plan of family housing similar to that under construction on the Carbondale Campus.

Mr. Blivas presented a brochure showing the arrangement of two- and three-bedroom apartments on two floors, with four apartments on each level. He indicated that although these plans are modifications of those used at Carbondale, the exterior concept had also been modified to take into consideration both site and existing academic buildings. He further indicated that all units are planned to provide a pleasant view; that parking lots are provided at a distance from the complex in order to eliminate traffic; that the housing area will be quiet and park-like, with a controlled road with gates; and that provisions have been made for laundry and meeting rooms on the lower level. In answer to a question, Mr. Blivas indicated that the units would be heated with gas, with each unit controlled by the tenant.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., the Board approved preliminary plans for Family Housing Project I, Edwardsville Campus. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none. Mr. Sturgis expressed the appreciation of the Board for the presentation, and Mr. Blivas left the meeting. A copy of the brochure presented was placed on file with the Secretary for deposit in the office of the Board.

APPROVAL OF LEASES WITH ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY

The subject leases are for the purpose of repaying the Illinois Building Authority for funds expended at the request of Southern Illinois University on matters declared to be in the public interest by the General Assembly. These are

permanent leases based on the now known cost of construction, and will replace interim leases based on estimated costs. The following resolution authorizing execution of such leases is recommended for adoption at this time:

Resolution

WHEREAS, the 75th General Assembly of the State of Illinois has declared it to be in the public interest for the Illinois Building Authority to construct certain building projects for the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University;

WHEREAS, the 75th General Assembly of the State of Illinois has appropriated funds to said Board of Trustees to be paid to the Illinois Building Authority as rents under the terms of leases to be entered into between said Authority as Lessor, and the Board of Trustees as Lessee, for the use and occupancy of said projects;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular meeting assembled, that:

Section 1: The projects to be financed for this Board for the campus indicated and in the amounts indicated shall be the following:

(a) IBA Project No. 75-21 - Construction of Physical Sciences Building, Stage II, Carbondale Campus

\$2,220,000.00

(b) IBA Project No. 75-26 - Construction of Physical Sciences \$ 905,000.00 Building Addition, Edwardsville Campus Section 2: The Officers of this Board be and they are hereby authorized and

directed to execute proper leases for the respective projects described in Section 1 above, requiring payment of annual rentals and total rent as follows:

(a) For IBA Project No. 75-21, said lease shall reflect a project cost of \$2,220,-000.00, rental collected to date of \$494,255.00, annual payments of rent of \$157,000.00 per year for an additional 22 years, and a total rental of \$3.948,255.00.

(b) For IBA Project No. 75-26, said lease shall reflect a project cost of \$905,-000.00, rental collected to date of \$196,875.00, annual payments of rent of \$64,210.00 per year for an additional 22 years, and a total rental of \$1,609,495.00.

Section 3: This Resolution shall be in full force and effect upon its adoption.

On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board adopted the resolution presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

DISCUSSION OF REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON INTERCOLLEGIATE ATH-LETICS AND SUBSEQUENT RELEVANT REPORTS

President Morris presented the Board members with individual copies of a compilation of various materials relating to the Report of the Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics. He reviewed the history of the Commission, indicating that when the Commission's Report was presented to the Board he requested that it be reviewed by various agencies and bodies within the University. The report was reviewed by the Graduate Council, the Faculty Council and the Student Councils. After these councils had completed their work, their reaction, plus the original Commission Report, was considered by the University Council, which is the chief advisory council of the University. The University Council has a recommendation, which is as follows:

POLICY STATEMENT OF POSITION REGARDING INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS RECOMMENDED BY THE UNIVERSITY COUNCIL

February 14, 1968

The following statement is quoted from the University Council minutes of February 14, 1968:

It was moved by Mr. Brammell, seconded by Mr. Soper, and carried unanimously that the Council accept the report of its subcommittee and recommend the following policy position regarding the development of intercollegiate athletics:

THE UNIVERSITY COUNCIL strongly recommends option No. 3 on page 10 of the report of its subcommittee.* The Council urges an expressed commitment to the simultaneous achievement of excellence in all the University's programs, services, and activities. It urges assurance that no segment of the University will be weakened in order to advance another. It urges that intercollegiate athletics be declared part of the activities approved and supported by the University. It urges commitment to the improvement of intercollegiate athletics, including football, but not disproportionately football, in the same way that the University is committed to the steady improvement of its teaching, research, and service functions. It urges a pledge that in providing facilities for all the University's programs, services, and activities, including intercollegiate athletics, construction will be planned so that additions and expansions can be provided as future needs require.

To embark on a program of growth and development of football which is consistent with the growth and development of the rest of the University and which does not penalize either the academic growth of the University or its support of such other sports as basketball, wrestling, gymnastics, etc. Such a program would provide more NCAA athletic scholarships for football but would also provide more NCAA scholarships for other sports. It would mean commitment to a gradual increase in the space and facilities provided for the total athletic program, not to an immediate over-provision for any one sport. It would mean that funds available for athletics from both institutional and student sources could be equitably spread over the entire program of athletics and not preempted by a single sport.

The Commission and the University Council had, in addition to the Report itself, the recommendations of three consultants, which was in accordance with the plan originally approved by the Board of Trustees.

Mr. Morris pointed out that many of the constituencies of the University have an interest in the direction of athletic activity, and although they can make their advice known and recommendations can be made, it is the final responsibility of the Board of Trustees to make the decision. He pointed out that he thought it possible to arrive at a consensus of judgment which might not be acceptable to all, but would provide a catalyst for the various viewpoints. He indicated that if the policy question was settled, that there still would need to be individual answers to such questions as the size of the stadium, continuing provision for the support of an athletic program, and the level of assistance for any scholarship provision. He pointed out that there were two kinds of funds involved - operating and capital. He pointed out that the students have expressed willingness to support athletics, although not unanimously, and that there is a feeling in the University Council that this is the proper way to go. Mr. Hitt pointed out that if the policy statement was approved, then the determination of the other matters could follow. He then moved the adoption of the proposed policy statement. Mr. Lockard seconded the motion.

Dr. Brown then pointed out that golf and football have been weakened and that he would urge emphasis on football for the fall quarter. Mr. Elliott stated that he did not think implementation should be limited to any specific amount or should be limited only to student fees. He pointed to the division of operating and capital funds and felt the University should not delay with respect to increases in operating expenses. Mr. Fischer expressed a desire to know what proportion of students actually supported an increase in student fees to support the program. Mr. Sturgis said the reservations he had had were satisfied and that he was ready to proceed. Mr. Lockard noted the importance of the decision. He stated that many feel that when a University grows it must have a larger football team. He thought the University had achieved in its athletic program what it had done with the old barracks building - gotten everything out of it that it was possible to get. He pointed out the importance of other sports in addition to football, and the attendant expense of football. He believed that the matter of the fee should be left open.

The vote was then taken and was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

Mr. Morris pointed out that he wanted to implement this policy in the next year with a base of known support and at a minimal limit. He asked for a motion for authorization to proceed to explore, with the intention of setting student fees for implementation to a maximum of \$10.00, or less. Mr. Elliott asked that there be examination of all avenues of support, not just student fees. Dr. Brown moved that the Board authorize the administration to take such actions as necessary to implement the policy. Mr. Hitt seconded and the following vote was recorded: Yea, Dr.

Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

TRANSFER OF SITE OF PHYSICAL SCIENCE BUILDING STAGE II, CARBONDALE, TO ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY

In order for the Illinois Building Authority to proceed with construction of the Physical Science Building, Stage II, IBA No. 75-21 at the Carbondale Campus, it is necessary for the University to transfer jurisdiction over the site to the Authority. The following resolution is therefore recommended for adoption at this time:

Resolution

Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular session assembled, that the transfer of jurisdiction of the below-described site for the Physical Science Building, Stage II, IBA No. 75-21 at the Carbondale Campus to the Illinois Building Authority, a body corporate and politic of the State of Illinois, be and is hereby approved:

Situated in and a part of the East One-Half of the Northwest Quarter of Section 28, Township 9 South, Range 1 West of the Third Principal Meridian, Jackson County, Illinois.

Commencing at the Northeast corner of the Northeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of Section 28, Township 9 South, Range 1 West of the Third Principal Meridian, Jackson County, Illinois; thence on a magnetic bearing South 3°-48' East along the Quarter Section line, a distance of 1370.96 feet to a point; thence bearing North 86°-02' East, a distance of 177.29 feet to a point; thence bearing South 4°-02' East, a distance of 204.24 feet to a point; thence bearing South 84°-18' West, a distance of 178.28 feet to a point in the aforesaid Quarter Section line; thence continuing on a bearing of South 84°-18' West, a distance of 6.72 feet to a point; thence bearing South 5°-42' East, a distance of 50.0 feet to a point; thence bearing South 84°-18' West, a distance of 193.06 feet to the point of beginning for this description; from said point of beginning thence continuing along a bearing of South 84°-18' West, a distance of 136.94 feet to a point; thence bearing North 5°-42' West, a distance of 317.35 feet to a point; thence bearing North 84°-18' East, a distance of 159.13 feet to a point; thence bearing South 1°-42' East, a distance of 318.12 feet to the point of beginning and containing 1.078 acres more or less.

And Be It Further *Resolved*, That the Chairman and Secretary of this Board be and are hereby authorized and directed to execute in the name of the Board a formal document of transfer of jurisdiction and any and all other documents needful or desirable to effectuate the said transfer.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Dr. Martin V. Brown, the Board adopted the resolution presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

RECOMMENDATION FOR DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

It is recommended that the Southern Illinois University Distinguished

Service Award be presented to Kenneth J. Gray, M.C., at the June, 1968, commencement or some commencement thereafter.

Congressman Gray came up through the West Frankfort and Pope County public schools, graduated from the West Frankfort Community High School, and attended the Army Advanced School during World War II, serving in the Army and Air Forces. He has been active in public affairs and civic affairs, was State Vice-President of the Illinois Junior Chamber of Commerce, 1953–54, and was one of the founders of the Walking Dog Foundation for the Blind.

He was first elected to Congress November 2, 1954, and has served continuously since that time. He is noted for his interest in public works and for his strong support of Southern Illinois, its activities, and its institutions. He is a member of two important Congressional committees: the Committee on Public Works and the Government Operation Committee.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board approved unanimously the administration's recommendation for presentation of the Southern Illinois University Distinguished Service Award to Congressman Kenneth J. Gray.

There being no more business before the Board, it was duly moved and seconded that the meeting be adjourned, and upon call of the question the Vice-Chairman declared that the motion had carried viva voce.

April 19, 1968

THE APRIL MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board, Carbondale Campus, on Friday, April 19, 1968, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman Kenneth L. Davis, Dr. Martin V. Brown, Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., F. Guy Hitt, Ray Page, Lindell W. Sturgis. Mr. Fischer and Mr. Lockard were absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Robert W. MacVicar, Vice-President John S. Rendleman, Vice-President Ralph W. Ruffner, Budget Director Clifford R. Burger, Assistant Director of University News Services C. A. Frazer, Project Engineer Wallace G. Richison; reporters Ben Gelman, The Southern Illinoisan, John Epperheimer, The Daily Egyptian, Jim Zivic, Edwardsville Intelligencer and Alestle; Gunnar Birkerts and Jack Hilberry, representatives of Gunnar Birkerts & Associates; Ralph Rapson, representative of Rapson Architects, Inc.; and Mrs. Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman appointed Lindell W. Sturgis to serve as Secretary protempore in the absence of Mr. Melvin C. Lockard.

The Chairman presented minutes of a regular meeting of the Board of Trustees held February 16, 1968, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. Dr. Brown indicated that, inasmuch as there is still pressure on members of the Board regarding the athletics question on the Carbondale Campus, it might be helpful if remarks of various Board members on the subject were included in the minutes.

On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by F. Guy Hitt, the Board approved the minutes of the February meeting as presented. The Recorder for the Board of Trustees was directed to revise these minutes to include remarks made by various members of the Board concerning athletics, with further consideration to be given such expanded minutes when presented for approval.

Mr. Elliott reported briefly concerning a meeting of the Merit Board of the University Civil Service System of Illinois, held March 13, 1968, which he and Dr. Brown attended. He indicated that regular meetings of the Merit Board were to be held on the third Wednesday of March, June,

September, and December. He further indicated that the Merit Board had directed the appointment of an administrative advisory committee to represent the universities, thus giving the universities direct liaison with the Merit Board. He stated that Vice-President John S. Rendleman had agreed to serve as Southern Illinois University's representative and expressed appreciation for Mr. Rendleman's willingness to serve.

Secretary pro tempore Lindell W. Sturgis presented and read a letter dated March 27, 1968, from Kathryn G. Hansen, Secretary for the Merit Board, transmitting a resolution honoring Dr. Martin V. Brown. On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by F. Guy Hitt, the Board directed that such resolution be incorporated in these minutes. The resolution follows:

Resolution

WHEREAS Dr. Martin Van Brown has served faithfully and conscientiously as a member of the University Civil Service Merit Board, representing the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, from 1961 to 1968; and

WHEREAS the assignment of other duties and responsibilities on the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University has now made it impossible for him to continue to serve as a member of the University Civil Service Merit Board;

Be It Therefore *Resolved* that this expression of appreciation of his service to the University Civil Service Merit Board, to the institutions and agencies covered by the University Civil Service System of Illinois, and to the Civil Service employees of these institutions and agencies be spread upon the Minutes of the Thirty-Eighth Meeting of the University Civil Service Merit Board; and

Be It Further Resolved that a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University.

President Morris presented Spring Quarter enrollment figures as follows: Carbondale Campus, 18,578; Edwardsville Campus, 8,398; combined total, 26,976. He indicated that these figures represent an increase of between nine and ten percent over Spring Quarter, 1967. President Morris further indicated that advance registrations for Fall Quarter, 1968, are substantially above the estimates, particularly in undergraduate registrations. He indicated the possibility of less growth in graduate than in undergraduate enrollments, reversing a trend of several years.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

PRESENTATION OF MASTER PLAN, SOUTHERN ACRES CAMPUS, AND PRE-LIMINARY DESIGN FOR CLASSROOM AND OFFICE BUILDING

Vice-President Rendleman introduced architects Gunnar Birkerts and Jack Hilberry of Gunnar Birkerts & Associates, Birmingham, Michigan. A brochure covering academic objectives, existing site and facilities, space allocations, proposed campus design, and proposed utilities systems was distributed. A copy of the brochure was placed on file in the office of the Board.

Using slides, Mr. Birkerts showed the Master Plan of a triangular campus designed to accommodate 2,500 students and divided into instructional space, commons space, and possible future residential areas. A single building concept, broken down into specialized instructional areas in four "fingers" was shown. It was indicated that buildings were to be surrounded by tree masses, rather than by parking lots, with parking space in strips between tree masses. Mr. Birkerts indicated that Phase I of construction is to include classroom and office space in two "fingers" housing electronics and graphics technologies.

Again using slides, Mr. Hilberry showed Phases II through IV of the proposed campus, including additional instructional units, a student center and commons building, and a library-auditorium-instructional aids center. He indicated that the entire structure was planned on a modular system, and that both exterior and interior walls are flexible and easily moved for expansion.

President Morris indicated that the Vocational-Technical Institute program should be state-wide in plan and not a replica of the junior colleges, but with emphasis on the development of new programs, certain advanced technical programs, and a planned approach to producing teachers for technical programs.

During discussion and consideration of the presentation, Mr. Elliott expressed his feeling that further investigation of parking areas should be made, aiming at provision of more adequate parking facilities.

Mr. Hitt indicated his feeling that the program carried on at Vocational-Technical Institute should be continued until such time as there is ample evidence that the junior colleges can and will carry on such programs. President Morris indicated that it was the intention of the administration to encourage the junior colleges to develop programs now carried on at Vocational-Technical Institute, with certain exceptions, thereby allowing the University to begin training teachers for such programs.

After consideration and discussion, F. Guy Hitt moved that the Board approve the Master Plan and the preliminary design for the classroom and office building, as presented; further, that investigation be made to assure adequate parking facilities. The motion was seconded by Ivan A.

Elliott, Jr., and the vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis; nay, none.

President Morris and members of the Board of Trustees expressed their appreciation for the presentation, and Mr. Birkerts and Mr. Hilberry left the meeting at this time.

PRESENTATION OF SCHEMATIC DESIGN PHASE OF RECREATION FACILITIES BUILDING GROUP, CARBONDALE CAMPUS

Mr. Ralph Rapson of Rapson Architects, Inc., Minneapolis, Minnesota, entered the meeting and was introduced to members of the Board by Vice-President Rendleman, who indicated that recreation facilities on the Carbondale Campus are being planned with funds from the Student Welfare Recreational Facility Building Trust Fund which was established several years ago. A brochure outlining the philosophy of recreation dedicated to the physical, social and mental well-being of all students was presented, and a copy was placed on file in the office of the Board.

Mr. Rapson used slides to show the general location bounded by Wall, Grand, Park, and Marion streets, with the possibility of expansion north of Grand street. He indicated that the original building clusters around a central enclosed daylight plaza, with gymnasia for various activities around it. Entrances on four sides lead to locker rooms on the lower level, a laundromat and nursery, a multi-purpose gymnasium, spaces for games such as tennis, basketball, judo, and handball courts. He indicated that the split-level building featured a suspended space-frame housing offices, lounges, refreshment areas, etc., and provides a view of the various activities below.

Dr. Brown indicated that he wanted more justification for the use of the site under consideration.

At the request of President Morris, the Board postponed consideration of the project until the May meeting. Appreciation for the presentation was expressed to Mr. Rapson, who left the meeting at this time.

GENTLEMEN:

Enclosed is a copy of the Tabulation of Bids for the completion of and alterations to the Library Building on the Carbondale Campus. These bids were received by the Illinois Building Authority on February 20, 1968. The Authority has, as is their customary practice, asked that the Board of Trustees recommend to them the contract award.

After consideration, we recommend the following award:

We believe we received excellent bids. You will note that on the base bid the J. L. Simmons Company was approximately \$20,000 lower, but when the alternates now proposed to be accepted are included then R & R Construction Company becomes the low bidder.

It is our intention, if funds are available at a later date, to recommend acceptance of Alternate No. 6, which would improve the air handling capacity on the ground through third floors of the existing building. The low bidder has agreed to grant the University an option for acceptance of Alternate No. 6 for one year from the date of the award of the contract.

The recommended contract award in the amount of 1,624,202 is 7.9% above the estimate of McKee-Berger-Mansueto.

It is my intention to arrange a conference call for Thursday afternoon, February 29. If you believe this to be too soon, you may advise me before then by calling me at my Edwardsville office, Area Code 618, No. 692-2211. Since the Board is asked only to recommend, we believe that a telephone call will not be violative of the public meeting law. Since the Board has not scheduled a meeting until April 19, we thought it best to proceed on this matter as soon as possible. We will, of course, include the item on the agenda for ratification at the April meeting.

CONSIDERATION OF BIDS FOR PIPING AND ELECTRICAL WORK FOR TUNNEL BETWEEN WHAM EDUCATION BUILDING AND GENERAL CLASSROOM BUILDING, CARBONDALE CAMPUS

Bids were received on Tuesday, March 19, 1968, for work to install piping, pipe covering, painting and electrical work for the heating tunnel along old Grand Street between Wham Education Building and the General Classroom Building. There is presented herewith the summary sheet and tabulation of bids indicating the engineer's estimate and the recommendation of the Carbondale Campus Architect for award of the contracts to the low bidders.

The total of the two bids, \$29,957, is 5.49 percent below the engineer's estimate for the work.

It is recommended that the Board accept the following low base bids for installation of piping, pipe covering, painting and electrical work for the heating tunnel between Wham Education Building (Building 0044), and the General Classroom Building (Building 0046) as follows:

ADDENDUM 1 TO AIRPORT OPERATOR'S LEASE AND RENTAL OF AIRPORT BUILDING FACILITIES

As has been previously discussed with the Board, arrangements have been made with the Southern Illinois Airport Authority to provide a new Terminal Building and T-hangar. These are to be financed by \$310,000 in revenue bonds supported by a 20-year lease to the Board, subject to the availability of appropriations for rental payments. An amendment to our fixed-base operator's lease to this effect has been executed and is on file in the offices of the Board. Formal ratification thereof is now requested.

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular meeting assembled, that Addendum I to the Agreement of November 30, 1964, with the Southern Illinois Airport Authority, as executed by the President on March 15, 1968, be and is hereby ratified and approved as the act of this Board of Trustees.

ARGONNE UNIVERSITIES ASSOCIATION MEMBERSHIP

At a special meeting held on March 27, 1968, Argonne Universities Association members elected Southern Illinois University to membership. Other newly elected member institutions are Michigan Technological University, The University of Nebraska, Ohio University, Oklahoma State University, The Pennsylvania State University, and The University of Texas. A list of current member institutions is attached hereto for information.

The following is quoted from the By-Laws of the Argonne Universities Association:

"The purposes of the corporation as stated in its articles of incorporation are: To foster scientific research by formulating, approving and reviewing policies and programs of the Argonne National Laboratory and by conducting or participating in the direction, operation and development of other scientific research laboratories and similar facilities, within or without the State of Illinois. Pursuant to Secton 2 (d) of the Argonne Universities Association Founders Agreement, the corporation shall not undertake activities unrelated to Argonne National Laboratory except with the approval of a majority of the then members of the corporation."

There are no annual dues or regular assessments for AUA membership. Each member university, however, is obligated under Section 4 of the Founders Agreement to contribute \$10,000 to AUA forthwith for working capital and to contribute from time to time thereafter, upon call by the Board of Trustees, such

additional amounts not to exceed \$15,000 in the aggregate for each Signatory University as shall be required to guarantee the financial integrity or meet the financial needs of the Corporation.

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees authorize the administration to execute an acceptance of election and make the required contribution of \$10,000 to the Argonne Universities Association, thereby completing the steps necessary for membership.

On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by F. Guy Hitt, the Board authorized the administration to execute acceptance of election, and to expend \$10,000 for membership in the Argonne Universities Association. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis; nay, none.

SUPPORTING SERVICES ACCESS ROAD, EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

Bids were received on March 14, 1968, for construction of the Supporting Services Access Road, as well as necessary earth and site modifications preliminary to the award of a contract for the construction of a Supporting Services Building on the Edwardsville Campus. A tabulation of the proposals received is attached hereto. The low bid was made by the Midway Excavating Company in the amount of \$591,998. This was 5% above the engineers' estimate and was beyond the funds available for the project. Funds were not available to do the project in the scope originally bid.

After discussion with our Associate Engineers, Hurst-Rosche Engineers, Inc., it was agreed that we would negotiate a reduction by the elimination of riprapping work and all water impounding provisions for the lake, which would only be seven acres in size, and to reduce the base of the road from concrete to I-11. This negotiated reduction amounted to \$161,598, leaving a proposal from the Midway Excavating Company to do the work now specified for \$236,700.

Since this work must be done before construction can commence on the Supporting Services Building, which is due to be bid next month, it is recommended that the award in the reduced amount be made to the Midway Excavating Company for the work indicated. This award is concurred in by Hurst-Rosche Engineers, Inc.

President Morris requested the Board to consider and approve award of contract to the low bidder, Midway Excavating Company, for the Base Bid, \$397,598; plus Alternate A, \$700.00; minus the negotiated reduction of \$161,298, for a total contract of \$236,700. He indicated that the administration would then explore the possible addition of Alternates B and C for water piping and electrical work.

On motion of Ray Page, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board approved the award of contract as recommended by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis; nay, none. A copy of the tabulation of bids was placed on file with the Secretary for deposit in the office of the Board.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR HONORARY DEGREES

It is recommended that at the June commencement, 1968, or some commencement thereafter, the honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree be awarded Milburn P. Akers, editor emeritus of the *Chicago Sun-Times* and acting President of Shimer College, and to John L. Childs, Professor Emeritus of Southern Illinois University.

Milburn Peter Akers was born in Chicago, Illinois, May 4, 1900. He received the Bachelor of Arts degree from McKendree College and holds honorary degrees from Illinois Wesleyan University, Otterbein College, and Florida Southern College. He served with newspapers published in St. Louis, Missouri, and Springfield, Illinois, 1923–1930, and with the Associated Press in Chicago and Springfield, Illinois, and Washington, D.C., 1930–1937. He served as Superintendent of Reports for the State of Illinois, 1937–1939, and as assistant to the Secretary of Interior, 1939–1941. He was associated with the Chicago Sun and the Chicago Sun-Times, 1941–1965, and served as editor of the latter from 1959 until his retirement in 1965. He is a trustee of MacMurray College and of Florida Southern College, and Chairman of the Board of Trustees of McKendree College. He served two years as a member of the State of Illinois Board of Higher Education, from which position he resigned in 1967. He is currently executive director of the Federation of Independent Illinois Colleges and Universities.

John Lawrence Childs was born in Eau Claire, Wisconsin, January 11, 1889. He received the Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Wisconsin, and the Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy degrees from Columbia University. He served at Teachers College, Columbia University, 1928-1954, with the rank of Professor, Philosophy of Education, 1937-1954; as Visiting Staff Member, New York State University, University of Wisconsin, University of Michigan, and University of Illinois, 1954-1962; and as Visiting Professor, Southern Illinois University, 1962-1965. In public affairs, Mr. Childs served as a member of the National Commission to Organize the Peace; as State Chairman, The Liberal Party of New York State; as a member of the A. F. of L. Postwar Planning Committee: as Fellow, National Council of Religion in Higher Education; as a member of the National Committee on Academic Freedom, American Civil Liberties Union; and as a member of the National Academy of Education. He was awarded the Order of Abundant Harvest by the Chinese National Government for famine relief work, 1921; the Nicholas Murray Butler silver medal, 1951; Columbia University Medal for work in Philosophy of Education, 1952; the William H. Kilpatrick Award, Philosophy of Education, 1956; Wayne State University, Educational Award, 1957; and the John Dewey Society National Award, 1964. He is the author of several books, including Education and the Philosophy of Experimentalism, Education and Morals, and American Pragmatism and Education, and the co-author of many others, including The Educational Frontier and Education in the Age of Science.

It is also recommended that at some future commencement the honorary Doctor of Laws degree be awarded Arnold H. Maremont, prominent industrialist, philanthropist, and civic leader.

Arnold Harold Maremont was born in Chicago, Illinois, August 24, 1904. He received the Bachelor of Philosophy and Doctor of Jurisprudence degrees from the University of Chicago and was admitted to the Illinois bar in 1926. He

served as executive vice president and director of the Maremont Corporation, 1941-1952, and has served as President since that date. He served on the board of H & B Corporation, 1950-1963, and currently serves on the board of Allied Paper Corporation, Phillips-Eckardt Electronic Corporation, Saturday Review Publishing Company, and Saco Lowell Shops. Mr. Maremont has been active in public affairs, serving as a Founding Trustee of Roosevelt University in 1946; as Director and Treasurer of the American Civil Liberties Union, 1950-1957; as a leader in the campaign for passage of the State of Illinois Mental Health Bond Issue in 1960; and as a member of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, 1961-1967. He is currently working with the rehabilitation of low income housing in the City of Chicago. He was the first industrialist presented the Chicago Human Relations Award; was elected to Knighthood in the Order of Merit, Republic of Italy; was the recipient of the Clarence Darrow Humanitarian Award and of distinguished service awards from the University of Chicago, the Illinois Association of Mental Health, and Phi Epsilon Pi Fraternity. Ht is noted for his support of the arts and for his activity as an art collector.

These recommendations have been initiated by the Faculty Committee on Honorary Degrees and have the endorsement of the administration.

On motion of Dr. Martin V. Brown, seconded by Ray Page, the Board approved unanimously the award of honorary degrees as recommended by the administration.

In the Executive Session which followed, President Morris presented the matter of the purchase of the Bartlett property (University Tract designated 182), and the purchase of this tract for \$88,000. The Board indicated an unwillingness to voluntarily pay such a price and requested the administration to obtain an appraisal from Roy Wenzlick Company of St. Louis before proceeding further on the matter.

Vice-President Rendleman then presented the Board with the problem of the relocation of the official residence for the Carbondale Campus. The official residence had previously been approved by the Board, and the Board had approved submitting this item to the Board of Higher Education. Vice-President Rendleman indicated he advised against submission of this project since it was not a new project but rather the relocation of an existing facility. He suggested that the residence be built without reference to the Board of Higher Education. After discussion and consideration, Ray Page moved that the Board approve proceeding with construction of the official residence without reference to the Board of Higher Education. The motion was seconded by Dr. Martin V. Brown and the vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis; nay, none.

HE MAY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board, Carbondale Campus, on Friday, May 17, 1968, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

Lyons, University Architect Charles Pulley; reporters Ben Gelman, The Southern Illinoisan, John Durbin, The Daily Egyptian, Jim Zivic, Edwardsville Intelligencer and Alestle; Rev. Paul R. Wigfield, Edwardsville Student Senate Adviser; Bill Clover, Edwardsville Student Body President; Dennis Zorumski, Edwardsville Student Body President-Elect; Brenda Morgan, Carbondale student; Kay Lockhart, representative of Rapson Architects, Inc.; and Mrs. Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Vice-Chairman presented revised minutes of the meeting held on February 16, 1968, and minutes of the regular meeting held April 19, 1968. On motion of F. Guy Hitt, seconded by Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., these minutes were approved as presented.

The Vice-Chairman introduced Bill Clover, Edwardsville Student Body President. Mr. Clover presented copies of petitions signed by Edwardsville students and spoke briefly concerning their desire for revision of the Board's policy on student housing in the following three main areas: (1) a separate housing regulation policy for the Edwardsville Campus; (2) the right of students over 21 years of age to live where and how they wish; and (3) special consideration for students 21 years of age or older. Mr. Clover's presentation and the copies of petitions were placed on file in the office of the Board. Vice-Chairman Lindell W. Sturgis thanked Mr. Clover for the presentation and assured him that due consideration would be given to the recommendations of the Edwardsville students when housing policies and standards are again considered by the Board of Trustees.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

CONTINUATION OF REVIEW OF SCHEMATIC DESIGN PHASE OF RECREATION FACILITIES BUILDING GROUP, CARBONDALE CAMPUS

At the April 19 meeting of the Board of Trustees initial consideration was given to the approval of preliminary plans for a co-recreational building on the Carbondale Campus. Time did not permit complete consideration of this item.

University Architect Charles Pulley and Mr. Kay Lockhart, representative of Rapson Architects, Inc., were introduced to the Board by Vice-President Rendleman.

Mr. Lockhart presented a schematic model of the proposed Recreation Building and reviewed for the Board the design of the project. He used slides to show various elevations of the building and the facilities provided. He indicated that future expansions would include separate buildings for ice hockey and skating gymnasia, handball courts, crafts and small games areas. The design features a central daylight plaza, surrounded by various activities rooms and special services areas; a suspended space-frame houses offices, lounges, and food service area, providing also a view of the various activities below.

Various questions from members of the Board were answered by the administration and concerned principally the size of various facilities. Mr. Elliott emphasized the importance of providing adequate parking space, inasmuch as the possibility of national meets of various kinds will attract many spectators.

President Morris asked that consideration be given to use of a geodesic dome for some part of the complex. Mr. Lockhart indicated that consideration had been given to such a dome, but that plans formulated by Rapson Architects, Inc., make use of tensile strength for roof support, which apparently will reduce costs.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Dr. Martin V. Brown, the Board approved the design phase of the proposed project. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none. Mr. Lockhart and Mr. Pulley left the meeting at this time.

RIGHT-OF-WAY AGREEMENT BETWEEN SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY AND SOUTHERN ILLINOIS POWER COOPERATIVE

The site of Family Housing Phase III has a major electrical transmission line across its north end approximately 150 feet south of Reservoir Road. Negotiations with the Southern Illinois Power Cooperative, the City of Carbondale, the Carbondale Park District, the University, the University Foundation, and one private owner have resulted in an agreement to relocate this line to run south around the housing site and back north to the road. In order to grant necessary new right-of-way in exchange for reconveying the present one to the Board, the following resolution is recommended for adoption at this time:

Resolution

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular meeting assembled, that the grant of right-of-way for an electrical power line to the Southern Illinois Power Cooperative in replacement of a presently existing line, in the following form and over property described in such form, be and is hereby approved, and the President of the University is hereby authorized to execute a Right-of-Way Agreement for such purpose in substantially that form.

And Be It Further *Resolved*, That the Board recommends to the Southern Illinois University Foundation that it also grant necessary right-of-way for this relocation over the portions of the site of the Family Housing Phase III project required for such relocation.

On motion of Dr. Martin V. Brown, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted the resolution presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

ROAD WIDENING EASEMENT, FAMILY HOUSING PHASE III

Because of increased traffic generated by the Family Housing Phase III project it is desirable to widen Reservoir Road between the project and McLafferty Road. The Foundation agreed with the Federal Housing Administration to grant twenty (20) feet off the north end of the project, and in order to add

to this forty (40) feet on the other side of the road the following resolution is recommended for adoption at this time:

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular meeting assembled, that the grant of an easement for road widening purposes to the County of Jackson, State of Illinois, over the following described property be and is hereby approved:

A strip of land forty (40) feet in width off the south end of the following described property: the south three-quarters of the southwest quarter of the southeast quarter of Section 29, Township 9 South, Range 1 West of the Third P.M. EXCEPT the strip off the south end thereof presently used for road purposes.

And Be It Further Resolved, That the President be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute in the name of this Board a deed of grant for such purpose.

On motion of F. Guy Hitt, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted the resolution presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

SUPPORTING SERVICES ACCESS ROAD, EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS, BID ALTERNATES B AND C

At the April 19 meeting of the Board of Trustees, award was made for the construction of the Supporting Services Road on the Edwardsville Campus, together with Alternate A. Action was deferred at that time on Alternate B (water distribution system) and Alternate C (underground electrical facilities), with the request that further investigation be made of either re-bidding this work or deferring its construction until a later time.

Attached hereto is a letter from the consulting engineers, Hurst-Rosche, Inc., which indicates that in their opinion the wisest action which the Board could take is to make the award of Alternates B and C, which, of course, are within their estimate. This recommendation is concurred in by the University Architects and it is accordingly recommended that the Board now award Alternates B and C to the Midway Excavating Company, R. R. 2, Freeburg, Illinois.

On motion of F. Guy Hitt, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved award of contract for Alternates B and C to the low bidder, Midway Excavating Company, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF THE SUPPORTING SERVICES BUILDING, EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

Bids for the construction of the Supporting Services Building on the Edwardsville Campus were received by the Illinois Building Authority on May 2, 1968. A tabulation of bids is attached. The Authority has, as is their customary practice, asked that the Board of Trustees recommend to them the contract award.

After consideration, we recommend the following award:

R & R Construction Company 735 Park Drive Alton, Illinois \$1,074,972

While the R & R Construction Company submitted the lowest bid, all bids were considered reasonable and within the cost range estimated by McKee-Berger-Mansueto, the estimate being \$1,050,900.

The total amount available for this project is \$1,170,000. Subtracting the bid award of \$1,074,972 and \$55,061 for architectural fees, engineering fees, and financing costs will leave a balance of \$39,967. This balance, however, will not be sufficient to cover the additive alternative bids which were as follows:

Additive Alternative No. 1: Provided for an access road and base for a parking lot.

Additive Alternative No. 2: Provided for curbing and guttering for the parking lot.

Additive Alternative No. 3: Provided for the hard surfacing of the parking lot.

The balance remaining will be held initially in a contingency reserve. The R & R Construction Company will hold its bid offerings open on the additive alternates until August 1, 1969. Before this expiration date the balance of the contingency fund plus other reserve funds will be used to complete the project.

The Supporting Services Building on the Edwardsville Campus will provide the basic structure for the combined Physical Plant, Campus Architect operation.

On motion of Dr. Martin V. Brown, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the recommendation of the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

UNDERGROUND TELEPHONE LINE AT VTI

The Campus Architect recommends the request of General Telephone Company of Illinois for an easement across the north end of the Vocational-Technical Institute Campus parallel to Old Route 13, and along the south side of the second east-west access road from the north end for a distance of one block. Burying this cable instead of placing it on the existing pole line across the north end will permit earlier removal of that pole line in favor of buried cable. The following resolution is therefore recommended for adoption at this time:

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular meeting assembled, that the grant of an underground telephone line easement to the General Telephone Company of Illinois in the following form and over the property described in said form be and is hereby approved, and the Chairman and Secretary are hereby authorized to execute a deed of grant in such form in the name of the Board:

Received of General Telephone Company of Illinois, One Dollar (\$1.00), in consideration of which the undersigned hereby grant unto said Company, its successors and assigns, the right, privilege, easement and authority to construct, and maintain its communication lines including the necessary underground cables, and conduits. To form a part of a communication system to be owned and operated by the said Company, its successors and assigns, in Williamson County, Illinois. The property of the undersigned over which this grant is given and the location of the line or lines to be constructed thereon are described as follows: A part of the $(NW_{\frac{1}{4}})$ ($SW_{\frac{1}{4}}$) Section (13) Township (9) South Range (1) East of the 3rd P.M. Telephone lines to be buried as shown on the set of prints attached hereto and made a part hereof.

No major tree shall be cut or trimmed without the prior approval of the Architect, Carbondale Campus, Southern Illinois University; as a condition of this grant, upon any conflict with future land or road development by the undersigned and offer of an alternative easement route, General Telephone Company of Illinois agrees to remove all its equipment to the said alternative route.

APPROVAL OF SALARY ADJUSTMENTS, 1968-1969

President Morris presented to the members of the Board a supplement to listings of recommended salary adjustments for faculty/administrative personnel which were approved at the April 19, 1968, meeting of the Board. He indicated that a small number of salary adjustments for certain administrative personnel would be presented for approval at the June 21, 1968, meeting. President Morris also presented the following item with a request for adoption by the Board:

resolution concerning salary increases for civil service employees, 1968-69

It is requested that the Board of Trustees adopt the following resolution concerning salary adjustments for Civil Service Employees for the fiscal year 1968-69:

Be It *Resolved*, The administration of Southern Illinois University is authorized to grant salary increases to Civil Service Employees effective July 1, 1968, in an amount not to exceed \$580,000.00 to June 30, 1969.

On motion of Dr. Martin V. Brown, seconded by F. Guy Hitt, the Board approved the supplemental listing of salary adjustments as presented; further, the Board adopted the resolution concerning salary adjustments for Civil Service Employees, as presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

President Morris presented the following policy statement and recommendation for application of policy concerning Intercollegiate Athletics:

At the Carbondale Campus financial assistance has come from several sources and has been made available in several forms to athletes. It is clear there will continue to be multiple sources of funding, and desirably so. However, it is now recommended that there be substituted for all other award and assistance programs a single form of support, the so-called National Collegiate Athletic Association Awards. It is proposed that the available support limit for a given year will be defined in terms of a number of full NCAA Awards which may be allocated as full or partial awards. (For example, ten authorized full awards could be allocated as five full, four half, and six quarter awards.)

It is further recommended for the Carbondale Campus that the Board approve a limit of full NCAA Awards (including tuition award) in the number necessary to convert all current forms of support into a single channel for the 1968–69

academic year.

In order to provide a regularized source of funding for the athletic programs on each of the two principal University campuses and to establish a base of funding physical facilities for each campus, it is recommended that a fee of \$10.00 be established for each full-time student for each quarter in attendance beginning with the Fall Quarter, 1968.

On motion of Dr. Martin V. Brown, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the administration's recommendation concerning Intercollegiate Athletics. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris indicated to the Board that the lease from the Board of Education of School District No. 189, St. Clair County, for the use of the old East St. Louis High School, will expire in 1968. The lessor has indicated reluctance to renew the lease. President Morris asked that the Board authorize him to meet with the Board of Education to discuss alternative arrangements or discontinuance of the programs carried on by the University in the leased building.

At the request of President Morris, Vice-President MacVicar indicated to the Board that the programs which would be affected if the East St.

Louis High School building lease cannot be renewed are the Experiment in Higher Education, the Department of Nursing, a projected Upward Bound Program, and the Cultural Arts Program. He indicated that if relocation of these programs could be delayed for even a year or two the problems would be greatly alleviated.

The Board unanimously agreed that the administration be authorized to negotiate with the Board of Education of School District No. 189 in an effort to renew the lease or to make other arrangements.

Mr. Elliott presented the following commendation, which was approved by the Board by common consent:

"I move commendation to Dr. Morris and the administration in the recent prompt, decisive action to control campus violence which is considered a threat by a few to personal safety, to property, and to the right of the mass of students to an education in an atmosphere conducive to learning."

President Morris distributed to the members of the Board a packet of materials concerning various incidents which have occurred on the Carbondale Campus during recent weeks. Copies of these materials were placed on file with the Secretary for deposit in the office of the Board. No action was required.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:30 P.M.

June 21, 1968

THE JUNE MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the President's Staff Office, Edwardsville Campus, on Friday, June 21, 1968, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

President Morris reviewed for the Board enrollment figures as of the third day of Summer Quarter and advance registrations for Fall Quarter, 1968, and outlined plans to attain an equalization of enrollment in the Fall, Winter, Spring, and Summer Quarters.

OPTION FOR PHYSICAL THERAPY ASSISTANTS, VOCATIONAL-TECHNICAL INSTITUTE

Approval is requested for submitting to the State of Illinois Board of Higher Education as a new program the option for physical therapy assistants leading to the degree of Associate in Arts, offered by the Vocational-Technical Institute.

The Health Careers Council of Illinois and the National Advisory Health Council to the Surgeon General both indicate a critical shortage of physical therapy assistants. For every registered therapist there should be two physical therapy assistants, but there are approximately 3,000 vacancies in the state in hospitals alone, not to mention the need in extended care and nursing homes. Accordingly, a carefully planned program has been worked out to enable students to gain knowledge and skill relating to physical therapy in classroom, laboratory and clinical settings.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Dr. Martin V. Brown, the Board approved submitting to the State of Illinois Board of Higher Education the proposal recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

INDEPENDENT AUDIT FOR 1967-68

It is recommended that the audit firm of Lybrand, Ross Bros. & Montgomery be approved by the Board of Trustees to make the independent audit of the accounts and financial operations of Southern Illinois University for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1968, and that the administration be authorized to enter into a joint agreement between the Auditor General, Southern Illinois University, and Lybrand, Ross Bros. & Montgomery for the audit.

The Auditor General concurs with this recommendation and will again share in the cost of the audit.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Dr. Martin V. Brown, the Board approved the auditing firm selected and authorized the joint audit as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

The death of Henry L. Dumas, Counselor in the Teacher-Counselor Project, was reported. He was born July 29, 1934, and died May 23, 1968. He studied at Rutgers University. He had been employed with International Business Machines Corporation, Dayton, New Jersey, and served as a tutor-counselor with Harlem S.A.V.E. and as an investigator with the New York City Welfare Department, New York, New York, prior to accepting appointment with Southern Illinois University in September, 1967. He was greatly respected by students in this experimental program and had attained recognition in the literary field as an author of poetry, fiction, and non-fiction.

The death of Edward Ferguson, who had been recommended for appointment as Visiting Professor of Zoology, June 17 to August 31, 1968, was reported. He was born January 6, 1907, and died June 12, 1968. He received the Bachelor of Arts, Master of Science, and Doctor of Philosophy degrees from the University of Illinois. He had served as Instructor and Professor at South Carolina State College; as Instructor at

APPROVAL OF ACTIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

It is requested that the Board of Trustees consider and approve actions of the Executive Committee in approving purchase orders and contracts awarded for the Carbondale and Edwardsville campuses during April, 1968. Detailed reports of such actions were mailed to the members of the Board in advance of this meeting, and copies were placed on file in the office of the Board.

A report of purchase orders and contracts amounting to less than \$2,500, in the total amount of \$229,007.88 for Carbondale Campus and

\$62,394.81 for Edwardsville Campus, awarded during April, 1968, was considered. Also considered were actions of the Executive Committee in approving purchase orders and contracts amounting to \$2,500 or over, in the total amount of \$1,518,509.81 for Carbondale Campus and \$226,001.80 for Edwardsville Campus, awarded during April.

On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by F. Guy Hitt, the Board approved and ratified actions of the Executive Committee, as shown in the detailed reports considered. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REQUISITION PROCEDURE

At the November 12, 1965, meeting of the Board of Trustees action was taken with regard to purchases on annual or semi-annual requirements which are awarded by bid. The matter presented contained the following:

"These are transactions in which estimated annual or semi-annual quantities are stated to competitive bidders for the purpose of securing bids. A Purchase Order is issued to the successful bidder in order to secure firm prices for the period. Services are rendered on items delivered daily or periodically only upon specific request by the University, and periodic payments are made on the basis of actual deliveries made.

"The daily or other periodic commitments against this Purchase Order do not exceed \$5,000. The items are generally of a common, predictable, and repetitive nature, such as dairy or bakery products, janitorial supplies, library binding services, gasoline, tires, fuel, garbage and trash removal, X-ray film, and similar items.

"These annual or semi-annual purchases at present require Executive Committee approval if they are in excess of \$5,000, and the resulting Purchase Orders and contracts are reported to the entire Board for ratification."

The Board at that time acted on this matter, and it was the understanding of the administration that unless a single purchase exceeded \$5,000, approval by the Executive Committee was not necessary.

However, on the audit done by Lybrand, Ross Bros. & Montgomery for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1967, there appears on Page 40 the following:

"2. Purchase Orders: It was noted that certain continuing purchase requisitions for food and supplies for aggregate amounts in excess of \$5,000 are not being submitted to the Executive Committee for approval. University regulations regarding purchases state that purchases over \$5,000 must be approved by the Executive Committee, which Committee action must be approved by the Board of Trustees.

"It is recommended that the University's regulations be clarified to state whether continuing purchase requisitions, each individual purchase on which is less than \$5,000 but the aggregate for which is over \$5,000, need to be approved by the Executive Committee.

"University officials have stated that recommendations for appropriate clarification will be submitted to the Board of Trustees."

It is apparent that either the administration or the accounting firm has misinterpreted the action of the Board. It is recommended that the Board approve the interpretation of the administration to the effect that if a single purchase does not exceed \$5,000, although the annual or semi-annual requirements in total may exceed this amount, specific authorization from the Executive Committee will not be required.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., the Board approved the administration's interpretation of the policy, as stated. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

McKee-Berger-Mansueto estimated the cost of the total project at 3,795,535. The bids are 76,818, or 2.03%, below estimate.

These family units are to be constructed from proceeds of a revenue bond to be issued by the Board of Trustees. However, as has been previously indicated to the Board, the legal limitation on interest rates which the Board can pay on revenue bonds is 5%, and in today's financial market it is unrealistic to expect that a revenue bond would have a yield of 5% or less. As a result, the administration has attempted to design a method of providing the financing until either the interest rates change, making feasible a sale on the market, or until the 5% limitation is changed by legislation.

A plan has been developed which would require the Board of Trustees to sell a negotiated bond for the amount of the apartment project to the Southern Illinois University Foundation at an interest rate not to exceed 5%. The Foundation would in turn pledge this bond and such other collateral as may be available and required to one of the major Chicago banks for a loan in the amount necessary to cover the purchase of the bond in the first instance. This arrangement would obtain until either the market interest rate or the statutory interest rate were changed.

On Thursday, May 23, all of the major banks were interviewed regarding this proposal by Mr. Melvin C. Lockard, Secretary of the Board, and Mr. John S. Rendleman, Vice-President for Business Affairs. It is hoped as a result of these discussions that some proposal will be made to the Board at the meeting on June 21 which will enable the Board to make the awards to the low bidders on the Family Housing Project I.

At President Morris' request, Vice-President Rendleman explained that it is impossible to issue revenue bonds at a rate above the legal limit of 5%, and that legislation is being prepared which would increase the legal limit to 6%. He indicated that in the meantime, until the bond market goes down or the legal limit is increased, the Southern Illinois University Foundation can borow \$4,500,000 from the First National Bank of Chicago and in turn use the proceeds of the loan to purchase a revenue bond issue from the Board at an interest cost below the legal limit. This will allow the University to proceed with Family Housing Project I, Edwardsville Campus, and the parking garage, Carbondale Campus.

On motion of F. Guy Hitt, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the plan presented by the administration for financing these projects. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the award of contracts for Family Housing Project I, Edwardsville Campus, as set forth above, subject to the availability of funds. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

CAPITAL APPROPRIATIONS REQUEST, 1969–1971

The capital appropriations request for the biennium beginning July 1, 1969, lists in priority order capital items for each campus. Total requests for each campus are as follows:

These capital appropriations requests will provide for an orderly progression of capital improvements in accordance with master campus plans and represent the requirements which will be needed to alleviate current deficiencies and provide for future enrollments and programs of the University. The Board of Trustees is requested to approve the capital appropriations request for submission to the Board of Higher Education.

A copy of "Budget Requests for Buildings and Other Capital Improvements for the Biennium Beginning July 1, 1969" was presented to each member of the Board present, and a copy was placed on file with the

Secretary for deposit in the office of the Board. President Morris indicated his recommendation for approval of such requests, with the understanding that the booklet itself would be subject to change in priorities and in designation of buildings. In answer to a question, President Morris indicated that the projects for which capital appropriations are being requested had been submitted previously to the Board by means of Campus Master Plans.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING INTERIM USE OF 1967-68 INTERNAL BUDGET FOR OPERATIONS

It is requested that the Board of Trustees adopt the following resolution: Be It Resolved, The 1967–68 Internal Budget for Operations of Southern Illinois University, other than salaries, be used as a base for fiscal year 1968–69 operations until the completed Internal Budget can be presented to and approved by the Board of Trustees.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Dr. Martin V. Brown, the Board approved use of the 1967–68 internal budget for operations, as requested. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

APPROVAL OF LEASES WITH ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY

The subject leases are for the purpose of repaying the Illinois Building Authority for funds expended at the request of Southern Illinois University on matters declared to be in the public interest by the General Assembly. These are permanent leases based on the now known cost of construction and will replace interim leases based on estimated costs. The following resolution authorizing execution of such leases is recommended for adoption at this time:

Resolution

WHEREAS, the 75th General Assembly of the State of Illinois has declared it to be in the public interest for the Illinois Building Authority to construct certain building projects for the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University; and

WHEREAS, the 75th General Assembly of the State of Illinois has appropriated funds to said Board of Trustees to be paid to the Illinois Building Authority as rents under the terms of leases to be entered into between said Authority as Lessor, and the Board of Trustees as Lessee, for the use and occupancy of said projects:

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular meeting assembled, that:

Section 1: The projects to be financed for this Board for the Campus indicated and in the amounts indicated shall be the following:

- (a) IBA Project No. 74-19 Construction of Supporting Services Building, Edwardsville Campus \$1,170,000.00
- (b) IBA Project No. 75-22 Completion of Library Building, Carbondale Campus \$1,355,000.00

Section 2: The Officers of this Board be and they are hereby authorized and directed to execute proper leases for the respective projects described in Section 1 above, requiring payment of annual rentals and total rent as follows:

- (a) For IBA project No. 74-19, said lease shall reflect a project cost of \$1,170,000.00, rental collected to date of \$249,705.00, annual payments of rent of \$83,235.00 per year for an additional 22 years, and a total rental of \$2,080,875.00 including administrative costs of 5% of project cost.
- (b) For IBA Project No. 75-22, said lease shall reflect a project cost of \$1,355,000.00, rental collected to date of \$156,510.00, annual payments of rent of \$93,890.00 per year for an additional 24 years, and a total rental of \$2,409,870.00 including administrative costs of 2½% of project cost.

Section 3: This Resolution shall be in full force and effect upon its adoption.

TRANSFER OF SITE OF COMPLETION OF MORRIS LIBRARY, CARBONDALE, TO ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY

In order for the Illinois Building Authority to proceed with the completion of Morris Library, IBA No. 75-22 at the Carbondale Campus, it is necessary for the University to transfer jurisdiction over the site to the Authority. The following resolution is therefore recommended for adoption at this time:

Resolution

Be It Resolved, by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular session assembled, that the transfer of jurisdiction of the below-described site for the completion of Morris Library, IBA No. 75-22 on the Carbondale Campus to the Illinois Building Authority, a body corporate and politic of the State of Illinois, be and is hereby approved:

General Description

Situated in and a part of the Northeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of

Section 28, Township 9 South, Range 1 West of the Third P.M., Jackson County, Illinois.

Detail Description

Commencing at the Northeast corner of the Northeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of Section 28, Township 9 Range, Range 1 West of the Third Principal Meridian, Jackson County, Illinois, thence West along the North line of the said Northeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of Section 28, a distance of 438.65 feet to a point; thence Southerly with a deflection angle of 89°-54′ along an assumed bearing of South 0°-00′ East, a distance of 23.42 feet to the point of beginning for this description; from said point of beginning thence continuing South along a bearing of South 0°-00′ East, a distance of 235.00 feet to a point; thence bearing North 90°-00′ West, a distance of 320.00 feet to a point; thence bearing North 0°-00′ West, a distance of 235.00 feet to a point; thence bearing North 90°-00′ East, a distance of 320.00 feet to the point of beginning and containing 1.726 acres more or less.

In order for the Illinois Building Authority to proceed with the construction of the Supporting Services Building, IBA No. 74-19 at the Edwardsville Campus, it is necessary for the University to transfer jurisdiction over the site to the Authority. The following resolution is therefore recommended for adoption at this time:

Resolution

Be It Resolved, by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular session assembled, that the transfer of jurisdiction of the below-described site for the construction of the Supporting Services Building, IBA No. 74-19 on the Edwardsville Campus to the Illinois Building Authority, a body corporate and politic of the State of Illinois, be and is hereby approved:

Description

A part of the Northeast Quarter of Section 21, Township 4 North, Range 8 West of the Third Principal Meridian, Madison County, Illinois, being more fully described as follows:

From the Southwest corner of the Northeast Quarter of said Section 21, measure Northwardly along the Westerly line of said Quarter a distance of 285.0 feet to an old stone marking the Southwesterly corner of lands of Southern Illinois University; thence Eastwardly along the Southerly line of said University lands a distance of 627.0 feet to a concrete monument; thence North 18°20′-20″ West (Grid bearing), a distance of 232.7 feet to Monument No. 110 in the University Grid System; thence East a distance of 442.60 feet to the point of beginning of the tract herein described; thence North 27°-13′-18″ West a distance of 70.27 feet; thence North a distance of 346.0 feet; thence East a distance of 339.55 feet; thence North a distance of 125.0 feet; thence East a distance of 420.00 feet; thence North a distance of 60.00 feet; thence East a distance of 130.00 feet; thence South a distance of 625.00 feet; thence East a distance of 1,034.61 feet;

thence North 27°-13′-18″ West a distance of 159.14 feet to the point of beginning. Containing 16.48 acres, more or less.

On motion of Dr. Martin V. Brown, seconded by Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., the Board adopted the resolutions approving leases and transferring sites to the Illinois Building Authority, as requested. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

STUDENTS' APPEALS

President Morris indicated to the Board that of the eight students expelled from the University, appeals have been received individually from three students and through a lawyer from five students. The lawyer has asked for deferment of hearings in order to file briefs. President Morris recommended that the Board, therefore, set over action on such appeals until the August meeting. He indicated that in the meantime information would be furnished to the Board, including transcripts, records, and reports.

On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board deferred until the August meeting such students' appeals; further, students are to be requested to submit any information to be presented to the Board on or before July 25, 1968. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

PROPOSED JOINT COMMITTEES WITH HOSPITAL TRUSTEES

President Morris reminded the Board that in November and December, 1967, Vice-President MacVicar had discussed proposed plans for Medical Education in Illinois. Subsequently, the State of Illinois Board of Higher Education had recommended the establishment of a medical school originating at the Carbondale Campus. He indicated that in order to proceed, the Board was requested to approve the establishment of joint committees of the University with the Trustees of hospitals in Springfield, the Madison-St. Clair Counties area, and Carbondale. He indicated that these committees would provide the legal mechanism by which the University and medical establishments would cooperatively accomplish medical education. He further indicated that such committees might involve either the entire Board of Trustees of the University and the entire boards of hospital establishments, or they might involve appointed members from each of these groups. President Morris requested the authority of the Board to work through established committees in the development of specific recommendations for presentation to the Board of Trustees and to the Legislature.

In reply to a question from Mr. Elliott, President Morris and Vice-President MacVicar indicated that hospitals, clinics, groups of physicians,

and possibly individual physicians eventually would be involved in the supervision of medical students.

On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by F. Guy Hitt, the Board authorized President Morris to proceed along the lines suggested; further, the Board authorized the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to make appointments to the committees being established. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

RECOMMENDED CHANGES IN THE INTERNAL ORGANIZATION OF THE UNI-VERSITY

President Morris indicated that discussion had been held both externally and internally over a period of two or three years concerning reorganization of the internal structure of the University, working toward decentralization by moving from a functional organization to a campus organization. He requested authority from the Board to proceed with an interim internal reorganization to be made continuing by subsequent revision of the Statutes.

President Morris indicated that he proposed as first steps toward internal reorganization the following: Appointment of Robert W. Mac-Vicar as Chancellor for Carbondale Campus and John S. Rendleman as Chancellor for Edwardsville Campus; decentralization of the undergraduate academic program, student services, and some business affairs. He indicated that the graduate program would be kept under an all-University Graduate Dean for approximately one year, with the intention of working with the Governance Committee to determine the strongest possible organization for the graduate program. He further indicated that for one or two years, at least, determinations will be made as to how much parallel there should be in curriculum, libraries and library operation, and the use of resources and facilities to avoid needless duplication.

On motion of F. Guy Hitt, seconded by Dr. Martin V. Brown, the Board approved the general policy outlined and the appointment of Chancellors for the Carbondale and Edwardsville campuses. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

The Board considered the following University matters in executive session, at the request of President Morris:

At the meeting of the Board held April 19, 1968, the Board expressed an unwillingness voluntarily to pay \$88,000 for the purchase of the Bartlett property, designated as University Tract 182, and requested an appraisal be made by Roy Wenzlick Company, St. Louis, Missouri. Because of circumstances, this firm was unable to make the appraisal, and the firm of Harry Herring Company, Clayton, Missouri, was employed. Their appraisal report was mailed to the members of the Board on June

10, 1968. President Morris discussed with the Board the appraisal report submitted and requested the opinion of the members of the Board as to further action.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Dr. Martin V. Brown, the Board authorized President Morris to offer \$62,500 for the tract in question; further, that if this offer is refused, condemnation proceedings are to be instituted by the University. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

The Board next considered salary adjustments for certain administrative personnel which, as was indicated in the minutes of the meeting held May 17, 1968, were not presented when other salary adjustments were considered at the meetings held on April 19 and May 17, 1968. President Morris presented the listing and requested approval by the Board.

On motion of Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., seconded by F. Guy Hitt, the Board approved the listing presented; further, the Board determined that the annual tax-deferred annuity contract for President Delyte W. Morris be increased by \$3,000, making a total of \$17,000 tax-deferred annuity for the fiscal year 1968–69, in addition to base salary of \$36,000 per annum. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

At the request of a member of the Board, President Morris indicated that the administration would reconsider the salaries recommended for three members of the faculty-administrative staff to determine if inequities exist.

There was further discussion regarding the reorganization. After discussion, Melvin C. Lockard moved that the Board require the Chancellors to live in University-owned housing and to use this housing as an adjunct to their office. The Chancellors are to be provided such housing as soon as practicable and when personal considerations can be resolved. The motion was seconded by Ivan A. Elliott, Jr., and the vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Hitt, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

There being no further business before the Board, it was duly moved and seconded that the meeting be adjourned, and upon call of the question the Vice-Chairman declared that the motion had carried *viva voce*.

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
