## College Republicans participate in Annual Lincoln Day Dinner

Members of the SIUE College Republicans joined members of the Madison County Republican Central Committee for the Annual Lincoln Day Dinner Celebration.

An audience of over 200 people met to hear Congressman John Shimkus of the 20th Congressional District, State Comptroller Loleta Didrickson, Representative Ron Stephens, Representative Tom Ryder, Senator Frank Watson and guest speaker, Dr. Ralph Reed, leader of the national Christian Coalition since 1989, talk about strategy for the next election, morality in society and American family values.

"We want to have a strong ticket for the next election and with who we have here, we have a strong chance," Dr. Reed said about the next election.

Reed, who has a Ph.D in American History from Emory University, has written several books and articles, and has appeared on Nightline, Larry King Live, Crossfire and Meet the Press.

His articles have been published in the New York Times, Wall Street Journal, Time and Newsweek. He has been active in 25 congressional campaigns.

Dr. Reed said that America is in danger of selling out to the highest bidder but that the beauty of America is its decency.

"This nation was not settled by covered wagons outside of Washington D.C. It was settled by three things; an ax, a plow and a book — and that book was the holy Bible," Reed said.

Reed said that work, faith

and the family are the three key elements essential to run an effective government.

"No man can put off the law of God," Reed said, quoting an excerpt from President Abraham Lincoln's inaugural address.

Reed told a story about an Alabama Supreme Court case involving a 15-year-old girl named Brittany. The girl allegedly finished a class assignment and was given an "F" for that assignment for writing on an inappropriate topic.

"The girl was assigned to write about a person that she admired. Some kids wrote about Madonna or Bill Clinton, this little girl, who came from a devout Christian family, wrote about Jesus Christ," Reed said.

State Comptroller Didrickson spoke about Reed's abilities as a Republican voice.


"Our featured speaker tonight, Dr. Ralph Reed, is a top national spokesman for traditional family values. Most of our problems have a character or moral basis like crime, drugs, illegitimacy, welfare dependency and failure to complete basic schooling.

"Many of these problems have been made worse by liberal big-spending programs. If it had not been for a Republican Congress, we would not be on a path toward a balanced budget or welfare reform," Didrickson said.

Didrickson encouraged the audience to focus on the upcoming municipal elections

"Municipal elections are fast approaching in early April. Many good Republicans such as Alton Mayor Bob Towse and Godfrey Supervisor Doug

**U.S., Canada have strong ties, Albright says**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dismissing differing views over Cuba, Secretary of State Madeleine Albright said Tuesday that U.S. - Canadian relations are in excellent shape.

“The strength of our relationship is overwhelming,” Albright said, welcoming Canadian Foreign Affairs Minister Lloyd Axworthy to the State Department. When Axworthy visited Cuba in January, the State Department reacted sharply, saying “it doesn’t make sense to reward a dictator in this hemisphere.”



**Angry Yeltsin assails another top official**

RUSSIA (AP) — Russian President Boris Yeltsin berated another top official Tuesday, heightening speculation over whose heads will roll in a Cabinet shake-up the Kremlin said is coming this week.

Days after blasting his prime minister and defense minister in highly public tongue-lashings, Yeltsin chided Russia’s top-ranking legal official for bungling investigations into several high-profile killings.

The series of admonishments has set an aggressive tone for Yeltsin’s state-of-the-nation address to parliament on Thursday. The underlying message: The president is healthy, and and poised to flex his muscles for the benefit of a public fuming over the government’s inability to ease Russia’s problems.

**Possible vote fraud in East St. Louis election**

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill. (AP) — A grand jury is investigating possible vote fraud in the East St. Louis primary election last week.

The probe includes absentee voting, which in several precincts exceeded 20 percent of the votes cast, authorities said. Absentee voting records for three of the city’s 44 precincts were subpoenaed and the grand jury left open the possibility it will ask for more.

St. Clair County State’s Attorney Robert Haida said he could not comment on specifics of the investigation, but said it stemmed from observations by investigators from his and other offices during the primary election last Tuesday.

**Man pleads guilty to possession of child pornography**

WAUKEGAN, Ill. (AP) — A Vernon Hills man pleaded guilty to possession of child pornography found in his home computer.

Edwin Markus, 27, exchanged his guilty plea Monday in return for a pledge that he will not be sent to prison when he returns to court April 9 for sentencing.

Lake County Assistant State’s Attorney Christine Moe told Circuit Judge Stephen Walter police found about 25 pictures of young boys on a computer disk on July 27 when they went to Markus’ home to arrest him on battery charges.

## Reinstatement of intramural basketball player is a travesty *'Decision takes away the authority of the officials in intramurals'*

This letter is in reaction to the reinstatement of a Stan Anderson into the intramural basketball program.

Anderson was suspended for the remainder of the season by John Bell, coordinator of intramurals, after Anderson threw a basketball and hit referee and supervisor Kory Kuffler in the back after Kuffler had called the game.

On Tuesday, just one week after the incident, Anderson was reinstated by Director of Campus Recreation Mick Ostrander, stating that the Intramural Sports Program did not do an adequate job of extinguishing the problem before it happened and also that the supervisor in charge didn't act in a sufficient manner.

Upon hearing this, the only thing that comes to

mind is that this is a travesty. There is no justification as to why Anderson is allowed back to play intramural basketball.

Ostrander said that one of the reasons Anderson was reinstated was because he violated a league rule in the "open" division and not in the "six foot and under" league. Regardless of which league it was in, Anderson assaulted an individual, never mind that he is a supervisor in the intramural program and was the official that night. It is still assault. If this had happened anywhere else on campus, would it have been handled in the same manner?

It is an embarrassment that Ostrander used his power and authority to override an intramural rule.

If he was in doubt as to the rule and was considering reinstating Anderson, he should've taken it to the Intramural Sports Council and let

# Carbondale professors are filling the mines of Southern Illinois

CARTERVILLE, Ill. (AP) — Edwin Thomasson and Eric Powell aren't dentists, but they do plan on filling some pretty big cavities.

Thomasson and Powell, researchers at Southern Illinois University in Carbondale, have developed a machine designed to fill underground mine voids better and faster than existing techniques.

The 15-ton machine injects a mixture of flyash and other coal combustion wastes into closed mine shafts, creating a rigid filler that should prevent underground mines from collapsing.

The machine is designed to fill areas up to 300 feet in circumference from a single hole drilled into the mine, something existing mine-filling machines cannot do, said Thomasson, the project manager.

"Previous work in this area didn't have the range that this technology has," he said.

Using flyash and other byproducts of coal combustion for the filler provides another bonus: If

successful, the method would help coal users dispose of the material.

Field tests are planned at the closed Peabody Coal Co. Mine No. 10 near Pawnee, about 10 miles south of Springfield.

Thomasson and Powell plan to test two methods for inserting the mixture. In the first trial, a toothpaste-like mixture will be blasted into bore holes at 600 to 700 pounds of pressure per square inch, instantly filling crevices up to 300 feet away.

A week later, they will switch to a low-pressure method designed to deposit a cone of drier flyash mixture from the floor up to the mine roof. High pressure air will then be used to blow the compound out onto nearby walls, where it will dry into a rigid filler.

The tests are designed to pump 10,000 tons of flyash into a void measuring 20 feet wide by 7 feet high. The machines can pump up to 600 tons a day.

"If the weather cooperates and Murphy's Law stays out of our way, we expect to have some good results," Thomasson said.

Mueller are up for election. They deserve our vigorous support," she said.

Didrickson also stressed the importance for candidate recruitment for the next general election in 1998.

"We need your help to elect more Republicans to replace inefficient, wasteful and sometimes dishonest office holders in Madison County," she said.

## School districts paying \$132 million dollars in busing costs for students

HARRISBURG (AP) — School districts are paying an estimated \$132 million annually to transport private school students, a service which they maintain is sorely underfunded by the state, according to a survey of 204 school districts by the Pennsylvania School Boards Association.

But Gov. Tom Ridge's administration points to funding boosts each year since he took office, saying the state is doing its share.

The districts are calling for changes to state law to help alleviate the cost.

"While these costs are indeed staggering, they do not really paint an accurate picture of the burden imposed by ... nonpublic transportation," said a summary of the survey.

"Many districts must run an entire complement of buses in order to provide transportation to nonpublic students."

Pennsylvania is one of 13 states that requires public schools to transport private students, according to the PSBA, which will discuss its survey findings before the House Education Committee this month. Of the 335,270 private school students in the state, 205,876, or 61 percent, are transported by public school districts.

Courts have consistently upheld the 32-year-old state law, which requires transportation for students who attend private schools that are within 10 miles of the district's boundaries — including those in other states.

But the effects on the districts are enormous.

According to the survey, the average Pennsylvania school district transports 377 private students at an annual total cost of about \$214,000, or about \$570 per student. In addition, the average district transports more private

students to schools outside the district than to those within it.

State reimbursement pays less than one-half the total \$132 million cost. More than \$73 million in local school revenues, primarily property taxes, are required each year to pay for the service after state reimbursement, the study said.

But state funding to the districts has increased since Ridge took office, from \$70 per student in the early 1990s to \$200 per student today, said Education Department spokesman Dan Langan.

In addition, the state allocated about \$329.5 million for total transportation costs and an additional \$38 million towards costs for private school student transportation in 1995-96 — nearly 5 percent more than in 1994-95.

"The law is clear. These students are entitled to transportation. ... The administration recognizes the cost of transporting them," Langan said.

Even so, the districts say more relief is needed.

Taxpayers in the Garnet Valley school district in Delaware County paid more than \$300,000 in 1995-96 to transport 156 private students to 35 private schools, including 13 over the Delaware state line, said business manager Tom Delaney.

"I keep scratching my head over this. We're right next to Wilmington (Del.), and that city doesn't have busing. So people are moving into our district and getting their kids bused to Wilmington schools. It's perfectly legal here," Delaney said.

More than 40 percent of the surveyed school districts said they must operate a separate vehicle to transport one private school student, the survey said.

# Yogurt welcomed as meat substitute in Ariz. school districts

(AP) — Goodbye, mystery meat!

Yogurt, once found mostly in health food stores, will become commonplace in school cafeterias across Arizona now that the U.S. Department of Agriculture has approved it as a meat substitute.

The woman who makes the food decisions for students in Prescott and Humboldt did not know about Monday's decision by the Agriculture Department.

"That is great news. It will break the monotony," Cathy Getz, food supervisor for the Prescott Unified and Humboldt Unified school districts, said Tuesday.

Even better, offering yogurt as an entree will enforce the idea that a meal "doesn't have to be meat and potatoes and bread and a vegetable," she said.

"A meal can be one or two components."

Some districts are concerned about adding yogurt for two reasons: how much it will cost and who will eat it.

Yogurt already is sold in the cafeterias in the Lake Havasu school district. Most of the buyers in the 5,000-student district are girls, said Bill Helmtoller, director of food services.

"Boys won't eat it. The

boys want the greasy food. Hamburgers, hot dogs, those types of things," he said. "They have been so brainwashed pizzas and hamburgers. I'm sure if they would try it they would like it."

Helmtoller also is concerned about the cost of offering yogurt as an alternative.

"If this is going to be a nationwide thing, the price should come down. We usually run entrees in the price range of 20 to 30 cents, and yogurt probably runs 50 to 60 cents per serving," he said.

Students should not count on seeing yogurt as an entree immediately. Many districts plan their menus weeks in advance.

In Prescott and Humboldt, for example, the menus already are planned through April, Getz said. There are about 5,200 students in the Prescott district and 4,500 in Humboldt district.

An increasing number of students who are vegetarians also will benefit from the change, said Jill Benza, director of food and nutrition for Mesa Unified School District.

It "will let us provide a protein item for those children who do not eat meat," she said.

# HOWARD STERN?

**N**ot since Adolf Hitler has a man been so loved and so loathed at the same time as Howard Stern. Well, that might be a bit extreme, but the general public does have a strong opinion about him. That opinion is about to change for some, however. Tomorrow, the world can witness “Private Parts,” the epic new film about Stern’s rise to power.

The biggest shock is not the amount of bathroom humor or nudity, but it’s that Stern has a heart. Not only that, but he is just a big old softy when it comes to his wife. On the air, Stern reveals many of the secrets of their private life, but at home audiences get to see him stay true and fight for the woman he loves.

“What I thought was most interesting was to take you back to when I was 20 years old, to this insecure guy. I was a super geek. I was socially inept. I was horrible on the air. I couldn’t even catch my breath. I wanted to show this loser (me) make it, against all odds, and to show who this woman is who would marry me. I wanted to answer the question, ‘What kind of woman would live with Howard Stern?’ There’s a very strange marriage here, we’ve been married for 20 years now. She is so wonderful to me,” said Stern.

In the film, Stern and the rest of his on-air staff all play themselves, but his wife Alison is played by Mary McCormack. “Finding someone to play Alison was the hardest thing to do, because she is really the humanity, the backbone of the film. It was difficult to find someone who could play into the reality of the film. She [Alison] saw the film four weeks ago, and she got teary eyed. There’s a lot of emotional points in the film. She [Alison] thought Mary hit the right tone and accurately portrayed our relationship,” Stern said.

The film shows many personal areas in the lives of the Sterns, including a sensitive scene dealing with Alison’s miscarriage, taking place at the doctor’s office. The next scene, however, has Stern joking about it on the air. This part, in particular, gives his audience an idea of what Stern is trying to achieve on the radio, total honesty.

“I thought I was betraying her [Alison], in a sense, by revealing every aspect of our sex life or talking about her miscarriage on the air. By the time you leave the theater, you understand the love between us. I’m revealing the side you can’t see on the radio,” he said.

When it came time to find out what kind of film had been made, Paramount began test screening the film in various areas of the country. What happened next was a real shock to Stern. “We went to Seattle, an area where I’m not on the air, and people were applauding like I’ve never seen before.

We went back to this room to wait and this guy

from Paramount came in and said, ‘Congratulations, you just had the highest test in Paramount history.’ I said, ‘What does that mean?’ and he said, ‘You just tested higher than Forrest Gump and Indiana Jones.’ I just got the shakes,” said Stern.

**T**hings were not always this peachy for Stern, and the film shows his battles to get some respect on the air, mostly with his former boss at NBC, affectionately known as “Pig Vomit.” “Losing your job constantly is a

good way to re-evaluate your life," Stern said. "I thought I would be a disc jockey traveling around the country. Pig Vomit is no longer in my life, but there's always a Pig Vomit in our lives. I think there are so many people out there who have dreams, but because of their Pig Vomit, they crack and give up that dream. I think the Pig Vomits in our lives are the people who are insecure about themselves and they crush us. Pig Vomit almost won the battle. He almost got rid of me, many times, and my career would have died. That would have been a crushing blow," said Stern.

Stern had an original idea about how to perform radio by letting all the thoughts in his head rush out, with no inhibitions. This practice has made him a hero to some, and a sexist pig to others. "If anyone admires me, the only thing they admire is the honesty," Stern said. "We have such dull mediums that maybe it's refreshing to see someone who makes it up. I thought it would be refreshing to split my head open on the air and let those thoughts come out."

"I always thought it was absurd that someone would label me sexist. I'm a heterosexual male, and if I am splitting my head open and letting the thoughts run out, I have a sexual thought every five minutes. That's part of the problem with having a penis, and I thought women would find that refreshing," said Stern. "Some women and some men misunderstand that I wouldn't say that stuff in real life, because in real life we are all fakes and phonies. We hide our sexual thoughts."

So, now that Stern has written two best sellers, "Private Parts" and "Miss America," and starred in a soon-to-be-successful movie, why does he continue to stay in radio?

"The reason I'm still on the air is because of the one thing that frustrates me the most: I'm still not in every city. There are guys out there using my material. This type of radio was my innovation and they're stealing it. I feel incomplete. I don't understand why we're not (everywhere), we make millions of dollars," said Stern. "The whole notion that radio has to be local is wrong. The whole thing is that we're in a global village, even though that's overused."

Stern has had many scuffles with the Federal Communications Commission over his use of language on the air, so he was sure he would have a difficult time with the Motion Picture Association of America (MPAA), when the time came to get the rating for "Private Parts."



"When we went in front of the MPAA, I really thought we'd get an NC-17. I thought it was an R film, but because of my reputation, I thought we'd have to cut out things," said Stern. "When Paramount came back, they told me they [the MPAA] usually don't say much, they're just a cross-section of people. They said they really loved the film, they gave it an R rating, and they said P a u l G i a m a t t i deserves an Academy Award. We didn't have to cut one thing out of the film."

The box office has been a virtual massacre lately, with the "Star Wars" mammoth running a gamut over all the competition. In an odd move last week, "Return of the Jedi" was pushed up a week, off the date it shared with "Private Parts."

"'Jedi' moved off our date and people are making a lot out of that. I just thought if I put out a good product, people would come. I feel that I've made a

very good film," said Stern.

"People were telling me to move off 'Jedi's' date (before the film was pushed up), and I said no. It was absurd. I can't plan my life around a 20 year old re-release, especially 'Jedi,' the worst of them all. The zippers are showing [on the Ewoks], unless they digitally removed those. They backed down, which pleases me," he said.

Love 'im or hate 'im, Stern has come and conquered with his radio show, books, television program on E!, and now with his film, he has truly become the King of all Media. □



## Cougar Track Roundcount national bound

It took breaking a school record, but senior Travis Roundcount qualified for the Nationals last weekend in the final meet of the SIUE indoor track season.

Six SIUE track team members made the trip to Bloomington, In. for the Indiana Invitational to conclude their indoor season, but Roundcount earned the right to compete in the Nationals in Indianapolis next weekend. Roundcount broke the 800-meter school record with a time of 1:53.53.

"He has the ability and determination to become an All-American," head coach Darryl Frerker said.

Freshman Nicole Done set the SIUE indoor record in the 3000-meters which had been eluding her all season. The Granite City native ran 10:29.23 to end a productive first year on the squad.

"It was nice to see her achieve this as a freshman," Frerker said. "She had been consistently running close to the record all season, and to finally break it shows how hard she has worked."

Luke Lay ran a personal record of 50.05 in the 400-meters and senior Gus Coronado, in his final indoor meet, ran strong in his events.

Senior Vicki Johnson ran in the 3000-meters and Craig Firkins competed in the mile.

Having broken three records in the indoor season, Frerker is excited about how his men's and women's track squads will compete in the outdoor season.

## SIUE junior wins second straight bowling championship

Shelly Goleanor, an SIUE junior, won her second consecutive Association of College Unions-International (ACUI) Individual All-Events Bowling Championship.

Goleanor's total pin count for the nine game event was 1924 (a 213 average) and was 23 pins ahead of Christy Lynette of Indiana State.

Goleanor was steady in her first and third three-game blocks shooting 609 and 597, respectively. Goleanor, in

eighth place after the first three games, shot 257-269-192=718 to take a 90 pin lead after six games.

While most thought, with that big a lead the event was all but over, Lynette, in 11th

place after 6 games and 15 pins back, shot 236, 290 (tournament high game) 211 for a 737 series. Third place finisher, Marnie Ross-Vincennes, was 3 pins back with an 1871 total.

Other notable SIUE finishes was a second place by junior John Bukovac in the Men's Billiard competition. After 12 hours of matches Saturday, Bukovac reached the semi-finals on Sunday. In the double elimination format, Bukovac, who won his semi-final match,

would have to defeat Illinois State's Danny Lovell in two best-of-seven matches. Bukovac won the first match 7-6, but then was defeated 7-3.


