

## Distinguished service award and two honorary degrees to be given at commencement

 News ReporterSIUE will award one posthumous Distinguished Service Award and two honorary degrees at commencement ceremonies in May and June.

The Posthumous Distinguished Service Award will be given in memory of the late Mildred Arnold.
"She was a tireless worker. She worked many hours for the benefit of the university," Director of University News Services Sam Smith said.

Arnold was the founding editor of alumni publications at SIUE and served until October 1, 1996. She worked as an editorial writer for University News Services from the Broadview Hotel in East St. Louis when plans were being made to establish the SIUE campus in 1957. She started alumni publications and served as a civic and educational group leader throughout her career.
"She was a wonderful person. She was one of the most dedicated employees I've ever known," Smith said.

Arnold held many offices over the 50 years she worked for university relations including offices in the American Alumni Council, the American College of Public Relations and the Council for Advancement and Support of Education.
"She lived for the university. The university was her life," Smith said.

Arnold was a graduate of DePauw University and served as editor of the DePauw alumni magazine for eight years before becoming the alumni editor at SIU at Carbondale in 1955. She completed her master's degree at SIUC and married Professor George Arnold of the physics faculty. They
moved to the Metro East area when SIU bought the former Shurtleff College campus at Alton.

In 1993, Arnold was given the President's Award of Merit and she received the Warren Stookey Award for Meritorious Service in 1994 from the SIUE Alumni Association. The Edwardsville Rotary Club named her a Paul Harris Fellow in notice of her dedication and achievement. At the time of her death, Arnold was in her third year as the president of the SIUE Friends of Music organization.
"She certainly had a major effect on the university. She impacted the lives of a great many people," Smith said.

Arnold, who died on January 11, 1997, was a volunteer for the SIUE Friends of Lovejoy organization.

The two honorary degrees to be presented will be given to Dr. James Appleberry, president of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) and Dr. James B. Machen, provost and executive vice president for Academic Affairs at the University of Michigan.

Dr. Appleberry, who has been the president of AASCU since 1991, has been acclaimed as one of America's foremost higher education leaders. Appleberry began his career as a teacher and principal in the rural schools of Knob Noster, Mo.

After his experiences there, he joined the faculty of Central Missouri State University. He became head of the Administration and Higher Education department at Oklahoma State University and later became the director of Planning and assistant to please see AWARDS, page 6

## Student Senate discussed student drug and alcohol abuse problems

The focus of the Student Government meeting held Friday was ways to deal with the drug and alcohol abuse problem on campus.
Handling the drug and alcohol abuse problem will involve recognizing it among students whether they live on or off campus. Senator Bill Anderson said campus-wide measures will be necessary to "curb the problem."

A committee was assigned by the Student Senate to facilitate possible solutions to the campus situation. Student Trustee Sean Pohl will head the committee.
"I'm glad to be heading up
the solution to the drug and alcohol problem on campus," he said.

One step toward action against the problem was discussed. Students might be able to call a cab service to pick them up when under the influence of alcohol. When students are picked up, they will present their ID's to the driver, and the cost for the ride home will be turned over to accounts receivable. The cost will then be added to tuition expenses.
A suggestion for drug and alcohol awareness education made available for students during Welcome Week was made by President Nance. He also suggested that if any students know of illegal
activities occurring on campus, they should inform the campus police department.
"Let them know of any activity that's going on, on campus, especially if it's related to drugs or alcohol, which is our biggest problem here," President Nance said.

Another issue discussed was promoting a more police-friendly environment on campus. One way to encourage the police-student relationship will be the Shop with a Cop program.
In the program, individuals will shop with a police officer and buy something essential for a

## Two disturbances rock

 university town

OHIO (AP) - Nearly 50 people were arrested after two disturbances in the Ohio University town of Athens early Sunday, one of them involving a brawl between two fraternities, police said.

The biggest confrontation involved about 1,000 people gathered in the center of the city outside bars that cater to university students, police said. When the bars closed at 2 a.m., people in the crowd began throwing bottles, eggs, road flares and bottle rockets. One officer was hit by a bottle. The other disturbance, about an hour before the bars closed, involved up to 30 members of two fraternities fighting outside a bar. Thirty-four of the 47 people arrested were Ohio University students.

## Search for Air Force A-10 in 4th day

MISSING JET (AP) - The search for a missing Air Force A-10 twin engine jet aircraft extended into a fourth day Sunday with no sign of the plane or the pilot.

The A-10 Thunderbolt disappeared Wednesday west of Phoenix during a routine training mission. The search extended to the Telluride, Colo., area on Saturday. A spokesman at Davis-Mothan Air Force Base in Arizona said the search continued in Arizona and Colorado.

Searchers have been unable to find either a crash site or confirm that the pilot used a parachute to escape, the spokesman said.

## Rubin to sign accord on war debts

VIETNAM (AP) - Seeking to develop closer economic ties with Vietnam, Treasury Secretary Robert Rubin arrived in Hanoi Sunday to sign a pact obliging the Communist government to repay the wartime debts of South Vietnam.

Rubin is the highest-ranking U.S. economic official to visit Vietnam since the war's end in 1975. Although President Bill Clinton lifted a decades-old economic embargo on Vietnam in 1994, and the two countries established diplomatic ties in 1995, a full trade pact remains elusive.

## Inmates charged in prison riot

PONTIAC, Ill. (AP) - Twenty-two inmates from the Pontiac Correctional Center have been indicted by a Livingston County grand jury on charges related to an outbreak of violence and vandalism at the prison last year.

The inmates are accused of damaging beds, toilets, walls and sinks in several cells in the North Cellhouse Segregation Unit on Sept. 2. The inmates were charged with criminal damage to government-supported property.

The disturbance began on Sept. 1, with yelling, arson and the flooding of cells and galleries. The destruction continued into the next day with the destruction of toilets and sinks, and vandalism to cell walls and doors.

## Girl will be kept out of school for rest of year

GRAYSLAKE, Ill. (AP) - A 7-year-old Park City. girl who tried to tote two handguns to school for her show-andtell is now out of the classroom for the rest of the year.

Officials at Woodland School District No. 50 have expelled the girl. She won't be allowed back at school until next fall.
The girl had been suspended since the guns were found in her backpack on March 13th.
"We have to take a hard line on this," said Woodland spokeswoman Mary Jo Pryzgoda. "We have to have our parents and students be responsible."

## Morrisonville man's sexual abuse trial scheduled

TAYLORVILLE, Ill. (AP) - A former Morrisonville man charged with sexual assault and sexual abuse against four boys is scheduled to go on trial June 2.

William Athey, 61, of Elgin, pleaded innocent to all of the charges Friday during an appearance in Christian County Circuit Court. Athey remains in the Christian County Jail on a $\$ 200,000$ bond.

Illinois State Police Sgt. Tammie Byers testified in a preliminary hearing that three of the boys were under the age of 13 when they were first molested.

## Letter to the editor

Concerned student responds to the Veenstra column debate; Veenstra's column should have addressed alcohol awareness

I am writing this letter in response to the article and letters written about the tragic car accident which killed two SIUE students three years ago. Matt Veenstra discussed his opinion of the accident, and his feelings for his roommate who died that night, in the article, "Only the good die young" and the letter, "We have to accept the repercussions of our actions." Several comments were made about Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity. I am not writing this letter to take sides or attack anyone, but as a student at SIUE and an educated individual, I was greatly disturbed by Veenstra's writings. I don't understand why the article was written. The paragraph states, "It's easier to have roommates that you don't necessarily care for ... than to have a roommate with the potential of becoming a really close friend die in an accident." By trying to connect this tragedy with roommate relations, he has belittled the pain that everyone experienced because of the accident. Yes, perhaps others could learn from this tragedy, but not like that. I understand that Veenstra intended his story to be a remembrance of his roommate. However, I think he only succeeded in criticizing and upsetting the other students involved, the university and the fraternity.

Veenstra's comments about the fraternity were not only unnecessary, but outright hurtful and insensitive. Regardless of what Greek organization they may or may not have been affiliated with, or how much they had to drink, two people died. Two
people that both had families, friends and all of the potential in the world. No one has any right to judge or criticize the manner in which another person grieves or deals with the loss of a loved one. Veenstra's initial comments seemed an effort to provoke a competition with the Sig Eps over who grieved more or who lost the better friend. Remember, two men died. They both left behind the same feelings to all those that loved them. At least show the same respect for others' feelings that you expect in return.

This accident that took two lives is often called a tragedy. It was just that. Senseless. Unnecessary. Placing blame, or even implying responsibility of others, will not reverse what happened that night. It can't keep those close to Sam and Jake from thinking of them everyday. Senseless deaths cannot be explained. Searching for some logical rationale for why it was Sam and Jake that died that night can only keep those grieving from living the lives they still have.

Alcohol abuse and drunk driving are not exclusively Greek problems. They are societal diseases which affect people of all races, ages and gender. Veenstra, who would you point your finger at if the driver killed in the accident was not a member of a Greek organization? Any student or faculty member could have been in such an accident. Greeks cannot educate the entire community, nor can we totally control the actions of individual
members. We are responsible for proactive alcohol awareness, but we will always have problems, just like countless other non-Greek students. Did Sam know he could have given someone his keys? Probably. Did Jake know he could have got in another car? Sure. Everyday we make choices that affect the rest of our lives. I don't think most of the students at SIUE need to be reminded of this.

Veenstra, I know you claim you weren't out to bad-mouth the fraternity and that you don't care what they have done since the accident. However, your writings have attacked them and shown disrespect for their loss, as well as others who knew Sam and Jake. I wish that your article had made a strong point about alcohol awareness. All the writings seemed to accomplish is to upset a large number of people. I did not want to submit this letter out of consideration for those who have already read enough about this issue, but I think somehow we have missed the point. Sam and Jake will both be remembered by those who knew them. The friends and family they left behind have had to look within themselves and to each other to accept this loss. We should all make an effort to be respectful of the different ways people grieve.

the Chancellor at the University of Kansas. He also served as the president of Pittsburgh State University in Kansas from 1977 to 1983, and was president of Northern Michigan University for seven years before joining AASCU.

Since becoming a member of AASCU, Appleberry has been the leader of many state, regional and national committees, councils and commissions on education. He will be receiving the honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree at the May 10 Commencement ceremony.
The other honorary degree recipient, Dr. Machen, provost and executive vice president for Academic Affairs at the University of Michigan, will receive the honorary Doctor of Science degree at the June 7 Commencement of the School of Dental Medicine.

Dr. Machen completed his pre-dentistry at Vanderbilt University and received his
doctoral degree from the St. Louis University School of Dentistry. He earned a master's degree in pedodontics and a doctorate in educational psychology from the University of Iowa.

As an educator, author and practitioner, Machen has greatly contributed to dentistry. He has held faculty and administrative positions with five universities and the U.S. Army Institute of Dental Research. In addition to being a past president of the American Association of Dental Schools, Machen has over 25 years of experience in leadership roles. Because of his accomplishments, he was chosen to receive the Distinguished Alumni Award by St. Louis University.

Machen will receive the honorary Doctor of Science degree at the June 7 Commencement of the School of Dental Medicine.

disadvantaged family, and then buy something for a child.
The Explorer Program for Children will be another project initiated by the University Police Department to encourage community involvement.

Area youth will have the chance to tour the department and talk to university police officers.
The police department will be painting bikes for student's use. Bikes that have been confiscated in the past will be painted red and set out in the quad for student use. This will help students who are running late to get to class on time.
"Students have to remember to bring back the bikes," President Nance said.
Parking and traffic concerns were also discussed at the meeting. Senator Arana, head of the Campus Recreation Advisory Committee, talked about congestion in the green and black lots behind the Vadalabene Center.
"People attending events are parking in lots that students paid for," he said.
There are three to five events that crowd that parking lot each year.

Another transportation concern discussed was the Madison County Transit service. Senator Robin Watson suggested getting another bus to take students
to Tower Lake after 4:30 p.m.
"There are enough students who get off work at 4:30 p.m. that there should be two buses available to take students to Tower Lake," she said.

Watson mentioned occasions when bus drivers were rude to her and other students taking MCT services to Tower Lake.

Students with similar complaints about the system are encouraged to take complaints to the Student Government office or to Student Senate meetings.
In other business, five senators were awarded certificates from Vice President James Little for attending the Student Leaders Training and Orientation Program on March 21. The senators were Albrecht, Edwards, Hopkins, McLean and Noyes.

Student Government elections were also discussed. Elections will be held Tuesday and Wednesday.
"Don't forget to vote," Vice President Little said.

Housing Director Mike Schultz will be attending the next meeting to let students know which type of necessary renovations can be made at Tower Lake.
The $\qquad$ renovations discussed included more computers for the computer labs and new balconies.

Runs were at a premium on Sunday after the SIUE baseball team had posted double digit run performances in five of their last six games. But the low scoring totals fell right into SIUE's hands.

The Cougars struggled to sustain a lead against Kentucky Wesleyan. SIUE went up 3-0 after the third inning thanks

## Cards hope home will heal wounds

HOUSTON (AP) - It's not time to panic for the St. Louis Cardinals. But it is time for them to go home, and they couldn't be happier about that.

The Cardinals stumbled to the worst start in their 106-year history with a 3-2 loss to Houston on Sunday.

The defeat dropped the NL Central champions to 0-6, with all of the losses on the road. The Cardinals, who had lost their first five games in four previous seasons, joined the Chicago Cubs as the only winless teams in the majors.
"It's going to be real good," Cardinal's outfielder Brian Jordan said, "to be home again, that's for sure."

The Cardinals have a day off to contemplate their historic start before playing host to Montreal on Tuesday. By then, St. Louis manager Tony La Russa hopes his players will have forgotten their dismal start.
"It's just a week into the season," La Russa said. "I don't want to send the wrong message to these guys. We have been competitive in all the games, so what does that tell you? It says we're close to being a good team."

They were close to a win Sunday, leading 2-1 in the eighth inning. Then pinch-hitter Jeff Bagwell, who had not started to

er, the Cougars jumped out quickly. Singles by Stephens and Ryan Crawford had SIUE threatening early. Stephens scored after Mark Briggs hit into a double play. ## Ventura does the waiting game with his leg

CHICAGO (AP) - Robin Ventura has been taking it easy. He has no choice. With his injured right leg in a cast for another month, he's not engrossed in selfpity or agonizing over his future with the Chicago White Sox.
"What else is there to do? This is what I was dealt," Chicago's four-time Gold Glove third baseman said before Friday's home opener against Detroit
"Illl be back. It's not like I'm done. They told me early on it wasn't that."
Ventura dislocated his right ankle and suffered a compound fracture of his lower right leg while slid ing into home during a spring training game March 21.

Now he's got four more weeks of inactivity before he can begin rehabilitation.
"Right now I'm just sitting on the couch, so
don't know how much in shape I'm going to be," said Ventura. "Getting around is not as easy as it was. Just a lot of things you take for granted are more difficult
"My wife has to drive me everywhere since I can't drive."

get a day of rest, hit a two-out, two-run double.
Ray Montgomery led off the Houston eighth by reaching on shortstop Royce Clayton's throwing error. Two outs later, John Frascatore (0-1) walked Bill Spiers.

Bagwell, batting for Tim Bogar, hit a double into the left-field corner for a 3-2 lead. It was the second time in three games that Bagwell had driven home the go-ahead run in the Astros' last at-bat.
"Frascatore has been our best reliever all spring," La Russa said "I don't think he did anything today to lose confidence in him. He missed a spot with Bagwell, but a lot of people have done that before."

LaRussa was concerned that the Cardinals seemed to be pressing because of their poor start.
"I think I see guys trying to force things," he said. "It's human nature. You see not normal swings and different things with guys trying to do too much. I hope they do press a little. Otherwise, they don't care."

Cardinals starter Todd Stottlemyre, who pitched $62 / 3$ innings, agreed with La Russa's assessment.
"I guess that's possible that we're pressing," Stottlemyre said. "But we still believe in ourselves.
"I'll tell you this. We're not going to run away and hide. One thing we showed last year was this team has character. Right now we're taking it a little on the chin, but we're going to continue to play hard. We've just been a little out-played in each game so far," he said.

The Astros, $5-1$ in their initial homestand, aren't counting St. Louis out either.
"They're not going to go away," manager Larry Dierker said. "What did the Reds do a couple of years ago, $0-9$ ? When they get everybody back, they're going to be right there. If they get to where they're closing in on the Phillies' 23 -game losing streak, then it would be something. But I don't think that's going to happen. They're still the team to beat in this division."

The score was $2-2$ when Stottlemyre singled to start the seventh and moved up on Roberto Mejia's sacrifice. Ron Gant's double put the Cardinals ahead.
Houston took a 1-0 lead in the first inning. Pat Listach was hit by a pitch, stole second and scored on Thomas Howard's double.
St. Louis tied it in the sixth inning when Tom Lampkin singled home Brian Jordan with the Cardinals' first run in 12 innings. - Notes: Dierker remained true to his preseason word when he did not start stars Derek Bell and Bagwell, giving them some rest. ... Craig Biggio has hit safely in all six Houston games this season ... Lampkin has caught 70 straight games without a passed ball.
