

The undergraduate team, Five Star, Inc., from the department of management, participated in the intensive phase of the International Collegiate Business Policy



Blood drive held in Meridian Ballroom

Despite the lack of numbers in students, faculty and staff members donating blood, those who did donate were in good spirits, and eager to participate in the cause.

Delta Phi Epsilon, the Biology Club, the Angel Flight group and the Red American Cross organized a blood drive Tuesday and Wednesday in the Meridian Ballroom of the University Center from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.

"We were just happy to do it, but we were hoping more people would show up to donate," Kelly Krahl, a member of the Delta Phi Epsilon sorority and a sophomore biology major, said.

Dawn Garner, the registered nurse in charge of the event for the American Red Cross, said that there was a better turn out at the blood

drive held in February at the Fitness Center.

A goal of 60 units of blood was established for each day. A total of 120 units were to be collected in all.

"We had 45 good units yesterday," Boris Okuka, a worker at the blood drive, said.

"The total goal is 120, 60 for each day. We're hoping to get the 15 additional units today," Okuka said.


The number of units collected for the two-day drive was 67 productive units.

FLORIDA (AP) — R.J. Reynolds knew as early as 1953 that there was a link between smoking and lung cancer, according to internal documents used against the company Tuesday in Jacksonville by the family of a deceased smoker.

Lawyers said the Jean Conner wrongful-death trial was the first time a jury has seen the documents, some of which indicated executives knew for years that nicotine was addictive and that cigarettes could be spiked to hook smokers.

U.S. to send \$15 million worth of food

NORTH KOREA (AP) — Responding to an emergency U.N. appeal, the United States announced Tuesday that it would ship \$15 million worth of corn to North Korea to assist children affected by severe food shortages.

State Department spokesman Nicholas Burns said the decision was not linked to a North Korean announcement, expected today, on whether to accept a U.S. - South Korean proposal to begin peace talks.

"We only view the issue of food for children as a humanitarian issue only," Burns said. "It is not linked to politics, nor should it be."



State law prevents welfare payments

CHICAGO (AP) - A new state law has prevented the payment of extra funds to more than 2,500 welfare mothers who gave birth to another child in the past five months, according to the Illinois Department of Public Aid.

If the mothers had given birth before Nov. 1, they each would have received an average of \$71 more per month. But the new law bans the former practice of increasing the grants to women on welfare for each child they have.


The public aid department says 2,517 mothers who received Aid to Families with Dependent Children were denied more money in February, saving the state \$170,000. Numbers were not available for other months since the new law, department spokeswoman Kathy Colbrook said.

Four men to be sentenced for drug possession

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill. (AP) — Four men will be sentenced July 22 for possessing more than 200 pounds of marijuana during a traffic stop.

A jury convicted the men April 8 on various charges involving conspiring to distribute marijuana. They face five to 40 years in prison and a fine up of up \$2 million, U.S. Attorney Charles Grace said Monday.

The defendants are Guadalupe Alfonso Castillo, 53; Martin Manazares-Sanchez, 45; and Jose Guadalupe Gonzales, 21, all of Brownsville, Texas; and David Zacarias, 22, of Davie, Fla.

Letter to the editor __ Name calling and finger pointing not necessary in debate

First of all, Ms. Hopkins and Mr. Gross stated their opinions and their reasons for their opinion. One may not agree with the opinion expressed by either Mr. Gross or Ms. Hopkins, but their reasons for believing the way they do were justified. The intent of justification is not to seek approval from the masses, but to offer reasons as to why you believe what you believe. Mr. Gross stated economical reasons for his belief that downsizing and mergers are necessary to economy. Ms.

Has anyone heard of Judge Roy Moore of Alabama? The American Civil Liberties Union is suing him because he has posted a copy of the Ten Commandments in his courtroom and has prayer before each session. The ACLU wishes to perpetrate the myth of "Separation of Church and State" which is nowhere in the Constitution. It is, as Neil Phillips pointed out in the past, taken from something Thomas Jefferson said. Neil has challenged me to read Jefferson's writings, and I did just that.

Children taken out of school after teacher tapes their mouths shut

KANNAPOLIS, N.C. (AP) — Parents removed two children from a Christian school after they said a firstgrade teacher taped their children's mouths shut because the class was making too much noise.

Truth Temple Christian School officials released a statement Monday saying that at "no time has any teacher or member of our staff mistreated in any way any student. Any charge to the contrary is false."

School Board Chairman Carl Ford declined to comment further when contacted Tuesday about the incidents last week.

Robert Winecoff said his 6year-old son, one of the two children whose mouths were taped shut, has allergies and asthma.


"We have to give him medication every morning just so he can breathe through his nose," Winecoff said. "Then the teacher tapes his mouth shut? He could have died."


Winecoff and Gloria Safrit transferred their children to Shady Brooke Elementary School this week.

Safrit said her son's teacher told her the mouth-taping was done in jest after she jokingly told another student the only way to keep the student quiet was to tape his mouth shut.

"Then she said the rest of the kids thought it was funny and asked to have their mouths taped, too," said Safrit, adding that her son was not upset.

Winecoff said his son was traumatized.









High school students to experience zero gravity

HOUSTON (AP) — NASA's famous "Vomit Comet" flew into weightlessness Monday morning and Hope College senior Rich Sturmfels floated in a lazy forward somersault like a water ballerina.

As the training plane hit that first arc of zero gravity, everything aboard cameras, pieces of paper, screwdriver bits, grit from the floor, the 6-foot-3 Sturmfels and two dozen other passengers — floated into the blank space of the converted 707.

"Whoooeeee! That zero gravity is awesome!" whooped Sturmfels, 22, as he sank to the floor with a soft thud at the end of the first 25second roller-coaster-like arc that produces the weightless sensation.

University of Michigan students won seats on flights this week, and in training programs last week, through an engineering competition that focused on experiments they would perform while weightless.

But as the flight time approached, most students seemed a little more concerned about their own motion sickness.

During their first arc, most of the passengers held back, seeing how they would adjust to the sensation. But not Sturmfels, who took to the acrobatics immediately.


It caught up with him, though.

By the end of the 90minute flight, and for almost an hour after reaching the ground, he tried to vomit, without success.

But Sturmfels rode happily much longer than Michigan senior D.J. Kroeger, 23. He lost his breakfast on the third arc and got so sick he was unable to help run the fluid dynamics experiment he had brought on the plane.

He quickly turned the same color green as his olive-

drab flight suit and spent most of the flight strapped into his seat at the rear of the plane, wishing the flight would end.


"Well I think my question about being an astronaut has now been answered," he said afterward, standing unsteadily on the tarmac next to the big white and blue plane.






With her slide presentation and opening biography, Hirondelle Hirondelle spoke on Tuesday. informed her viewers that her "work must have a meaningful function."



Long has also been a 4time semi-finalist on Star Search with Ed McMahon and will be appearing on The Tonight Show on May 16 with Jay Leno.





Guest went into this season with high expectations of himself.

"I wanted to remain at the level I was last year and improve on that," Guest said. "My goals for this season are to keep my ERA under three and to go out and have a good performance every time out. I've pitched to my expectations so far this year."

The fact that he comes out of the bullpen instead of starting is an advantage according to Guest.

"I get the chance to appear in a lot of games," Guest said. "Coach Collins calls on me when the game is on the line. I enjoy playing with the pressure on my shoulders."

After graduating, Guest looks to use his Mass Communications major to land himself a job in radio or television.

"I work for a small radio station in Nashville doing play-byplay for basketball games," Guest said. "It's great experience for me and I love doing it."

The Cougars are currently 25-9 with a 13-2 conference record after a victory over Missouri-St. Louis yesterday. Guest sees the improvement that the team has made throughout the season.

"We're jelling as a team better than we have all season." Guest said. "With the way we're playing now, we have a shot to get to the college world series. We have a group of guys who can beat the great teams."

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


